MOTION #C 2015-07-20-04

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Hudson to direct and authorize CAO Barr to prepare and submit a resolution that is similar in format to the resolutions passed to UNSM in the last two years and to apply retroactively in regard to funding for surplus schools that are turned back to municipalities. Motion carried.

MOTION #C 2015-07-20-05

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson that the Town use the tagline "where history meets opportunity" when the new logo is being used with a friendly amendment that preference be given to utilize the tagline in regular everyday use but the tagline is to be supplemented as needed for events. Friendly amendment by Councillor Mersereau. Motion carried.

MOTION #C 2015-07-20-06

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson that Council approve the ratification of **MOTION #C 2015-06-23-01** as approved by electronic vote; It was moved by Deputy Mayor Pat Power, seconded by Councillor Hudson to approve the Town of Annapolis Royal to pursue the Active Transportation grant application with matching funds from the Town or contributing partners, up to an amount of \$150,000.00 for the purposes of improvements and restoration of the Boardwalk with a deadline of June 30th, 2015 and that if successful all work will be completed by March 10, 2016. Motion carried.

MOTION #C 2015-07-20-07

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to proceed with staff pursuing the funding application for an electric vehicle station. Motion carried.

MOTION #C 2015-07-20-08

Yard Waste Disposal

Busy cleaning up your yard and not sure where to dispose of the waste? Valley Waste accepts yard waste with the regular garbage pick-up. This is a great way to dispose of BRUSH. All you need to do is put the brush into bundles that measure a maximum of 4 ft in length and 2 ft in width. Two bundles per collection are permitted. Leaves and pine needles can be placed in the compost bins. If you have excess pine needles, they can be put into clear bags and count as a part of your garbage limit (four bags per week). Excess leaves can be disposed of year round at the Valley Waste Management Centres, located in Lawrencetown and Kentville. But before you dispose of your yard "waste", consider that much of it is a great natural fertilizer. Tips can be found in the Valley Waste calendar or at www.vwrm.com.

The Town of Annapolis Royal does offer free yard waste disposal through Public Works. However, last year there was excess yard waste, <u>particularly brush</u>, that resulted in a **serious safety hazard**. Town is evaluating ways to make the Public Works yard waste disposal a more efficient and safer option. While we are undergoing this review, we hope to minimize its usage as much as possible and are therefore encouraging residents to make use of Valley Waste's service and/or consider alternatives. If you are a town resident and must use the Public Works option, drop by Town Hall to pick up a key. There is a \$25 charge for new keys or exchange your old key for free.


Lions Worldwide Week Of Service In Sight ----

Since 1925, when Helen Keller challenged the Lions to be knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness, the Lions have saved the sight of more than 15 million children through the "sight for kids" program, established or strengthened paediatric eye centres that have helped more than 120 million children, prevented serious vision loss for millions of children worldwide, improved eye care for 100 million people by training 650,000 trained professionals in eye care, provided nearly 8million cataract surgeries around the world and vaccinated 41 million children in Africa

against measles a leading cause of blindness.

Land Use By-Law Review



Where History Meets Opportunity

Town Council has heard the concerns raised regarding some of the regulations of the Land Use By-law and wishes to assure the public that these concerns are being taken seriously. Council is devoted to being proactive and responsible given the economic reality of Nova Scotia.

A land use by-law provides a foundation for a municipality to achieve the orderly development of lands through the regulation of the purpose for which the land and buildings may be used in various areas. Annapolis Royal has a unique, important history not only to the Region, but to the Country. The historic importance of the Town has been key to economic growth during the revitalization that has occurred in the last 35 years. As such, it was at the forefront of considerations when the Town's Land Use By-Law was developed. The rich history of the Town will continue to be a principal attraction to the area. The Town has reached a point where this is now established as core to the Town's identity. With this foundation firmly cemented, Council recognizes that the time has come for a review of the existing Land Use By-Law. While we must always acknowledge and embrace the past, we must however, look toward the future.

The reality that faces Nova Scotia, particularly rural Nova Scotia, is one that cannot be ignored. Attracting and keeping residents and businesses in the area is imperative to the Town's survival. Additionally, times have changed and by-laws and regulations need to be maintained accordingly and continuously work for the community. The by-law review will be mindful of the historic nature of Annapolis Royal and the central role it plays in the Town's economy. In addition to consultation with the community, the Town of Annapolis will also be obtaining advice from the Department of Municipal Affairs and other government departments, liaising with other municipalities, and seeking input from local businesses during the review process.

A by-law review takes time. It is also a costly endeavour. A review of a by-law as significant as the Land Use By-Law needs to be undertaken with great due diligence, factoring in the best interests of residents and businesses along with the economic and cultural implications of any changes made. Council also recognizes that Annapolis Royal can have too much 'red tape' that is restrictive to residents and businesses. The formation of a working group is a key component to helping reduce overregulation. By identifying barriers and alternatives, and working closely with the Provincial Government's newly created Office of Regulatory Affairs and Service Effectiveness, the group will seek ways to reduce 'red tape' and will make recommendations for Council to consider. Council assures the public that involvement will be sought from citizens and business owners and opportunities will exist for all to engage in the process. We want to make the process of interacting and working with Town Hall as easy and streamlined as possible.

Annapolis Royal is a remarkable small town. It will continue to thrive in its uniqueness and grow. Council is committed to this regulatory review and reform and balancing the needs of its citizens and business community with the need for a land use by-law that reflects our current economic situation. This type of process is not easy and Council appreciates your patience as we continue to make Annapolis Royal a place where history meets opportunity.
