UPDATE FROM THE MARKETING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Marketing & Economic Development Committee (MEDC) would like to take this opportunity to report our efforts to date. We had a tremendous success this spring with the Brainstorming Session with the community. From the data collected we were able to structure the committee and set out short term priorities. We have established an ARRA subcommittee under the leadership of Councillor Byron Mersereau to explore future uses of the ARRA building. Under the leadership of Jim McGinnis, the talents of Chris Cooper of Edificemedia, were demonstrated with the video trailer "Meet You in Annapolis Royal". We can expect the release of four additional components in Spring 2014.

The Community Mapping project is on going with Jim McGinnis, Alan Melanson and Councillor Paul Paquette. Adele McDonald has done extraordinary work on an audit of the Town's website. Further work on the mechanics of the website is ongoing with Adele and Troy Woodland, our webmaster.

The MEDC committee has refined budget items dealing with marketing and is creating a protocol for budgetary presentations by the various organizations in Town. Grace Butland adopted an inclusive-marketing approach with other organizations in Town that encouraged joining together for an "Arts Festival". We look forward to next year's festival. Peter Davies and his sub-committee conceptualized and adopted a "Stay Another Day Campaign" which included production and sale of carrier bags and aprons with the slogan imprinted on them. We now have an Events Notification process so that Town Hall is aware of events that are happening in Town, thereby keeping our merchants and accommodations people in the loop. We had a successful Tourist Survey this past summer and will repeat the process next year to refine what the tourist is looking for when visiting Annapolis Royal.

We are also in initial discussions with Acadia University for research purposes. We had a successful luncheon meeting with representatives with the B& B, campgrounds, attractions, museums and Board of Trade, our points of first contacts with visitors, to discuss this past tourist season and looking forward to next year's. The MEDC committee is pleased to see the reception we have received from merchants and residents during the first part of this year and we look forward to projects for the next tourist season. We are currently receiving possible slogans for the Town. We will be looking for your input once they are shortlisted. The Marketing and Economic Development Committee would like to extend its thanks to Peter Davies and Paul Stackhouse for their participation on the committee and wish them well in their future ventures. The Committee would also like to extend a warm welcome to two new members; Adele McDonald and Bill Monk and to Sandi Millett-Campbell who has accepted a new position at Town Hall which includes the Marketing portfolio. The work that the Committee has accomplished to date has been greatly assisted by the commitment and support of our staff at Town Hall, particularly, CAO Carol St-Amour and Administrative Assistant Dawn Bourke. Thank you.

Unapproved Motions from the Regular Council Meeting Held October 21, 2013

MOTION a - 324 St George Street

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Paquette to approve application AR13-021-HER to pour a ramp at 324 St George Street, as revised by the applicant's submission October 7, 2013 providing all conditions of the Land Use By-Laws are met. 1 Nay Vote, CARRIED.

MOTION b - 539 St George Street

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson that application AR13-030-HER to remove the existing carriage house doors to be replaced by a window at 539 St George Street, be approved, provided that all conditions of the Land Use By-Law are met. CARRIED.

MOTION c - 235 St George Street

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau that application AR13-032-HER to replace the back part of the roof on the rear of the building at 234 St George Street be approved providing all the conditions of the Land Use By-Law are met. 1 Nay vote. CARRIED.

MOTION d – 234 St George Street

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau seconded by Councillor Paquette, to send a letter to the owner of property at 234 St. George Street to emphasize the application process needs to be adhered to. CARRIED.

MOTION e - Town Hall Roof Repair

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson, to approve Glen Mugford as the contractor to proceed with repairing the roof as outlined in his quote in the amount of \$18,123.88 including non-refundable HST; and amended to include 35 year life expectancy shingles at a cost not to exceed \$300.00. CARRIED.

MOTION f - Appointment of New Animal Control Officer

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Hudson that as per the Contract Agreement for Animal Control Services between the County of Annapolis and the Town of Annapolis Royal, Council appoints James Rose as the Town of Annapolis Royal Animal Control Officer. CARRIED.

MOTION g - Appointment to Annapolis Pool Committee

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Paquette to appoint Christine Igot as a member of the Annapolis Pool Committee. CARRIED.

MOTION h - Memorandum of Understanding

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to authorize CAO St-Amour to provide a Memorandum of Understanding between the Town of Annapolis Royal and the Department of Transportation; and the document shall include the base rate for the 3 inch or 2 inch water meter, the metered water rate, and for a minimum specified period of three years usage and further the Town of Annapolis Royal will be responsible for the \$5,000 cost associated with the elbow, valve, meter and installation. CARRIED.

MOTION i - Removal of Shipping Container

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Paquette that Council direct CAO St-Amour to forward a letter to the owners of 669 St. George Street requesting that the shipping container be removed within 15 days of receiving the letter and noting that if the container is not removed within that time, Council will direct the CAO to place an official order on the owner to remove the shipping container by notice as provided within Part XV, Sections 344 through 348 of the Municipal Government Act. CARRIED.

MOTION j - Two Hour Parking Restrictions

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson, to retain the 2 hour parking restrictions in the two parking spots across from the Post Office. CARRIED.

MOTION k - Installation of Stop Sign

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau that the Public Works Department install a stop sign on the corner of St. George Street and St. Anthony Street to make a 2 way stop, on a trial basis in the spring of 2014. CARRIED.

MOTION I - Upcoming and Annual Events

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Paquette to request lists of upcoming events and annual events from the various organizations and further the information be placed in the Town Crier, on the Town website and to the community reminder list. CARRIED.

MOTION m - Luncheon Meeting

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson that the Marketing and Economic Development Committee hold a luncheon meeting with representatives from the B&B's, accommodations/surrounding area accommodations as listed on the Town website, Board of Trade and the tourist attractions, October 29th, 2013 and further that the invitations be sent out with a RSVP. **CARRIED.**MOTION n – Representative to Nova Scotia Association of Police Boards

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to approve the nomination of Chair of the Board of Police Commissioners Pat Power to be the Town of Annapolis Royal representative to the Nova Scotia Association of Police Boards. CARRIED. MOTION o - Fundyweb Broadband Board

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Paquette that the FUNDYweb Broadband Board be dissolved in accordance with Sub-section 32(1) of the signed Intermunicipal Agreement and Sub-section 30(1) of the unsigned agreement between FUNDYweb Broadband Board and Nova Scotia Community College. CARRIED.

MOTION p - Flag Flying Policy

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson to approve the draft amendment to Flag-flying Policy 2011-1 dated October 9, 2013 with the following amendments: change half-staff to half-mast throughout; under Procedure Item 4, appropriate to include Union Jack as the Royal Union Flag - Victoria Day, Anniversary of the Adoption of the Statue of Westminster Commonwealth Day; under Display of Flags on Power Poles becomes number 5 under Procedure; expand to read "Flags may be flown on power poles within the guidelines of Canada Heritage rules and regulations as set out in Flag Etiquette in Canada; and further, flags other than the national flag, provincial flag and town flag on power poles will be allowed on a temporary basis and will be removed within a reasonable amount of time (within one week) from the date of the event of the or the occasions they are used to commemorate." CARRIED.

MOTION q - East Hants Off-Highway Vehicle Resolution

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau that the Town of Annapolis Royal not support the East Hants Off-Highway Vehicle Resolution UNSM. 1 Nay vote. CARRIED.

MOTION r - Appointments to the Marketing & Economic Development Committee

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Paquette to appoint Adele MacDonald as a business representative and Bill Monk as a member at large representative on the Marketing and Economic Development Committee for the remainder of the terms vacated to December 2013, and further, that Council will consider re-appointment of all members on the Marketing and Economic Development Committee in December 2013 as per Policy 2012-3. CARRIED.

MOTION s - Length of Council Meetings

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Hudson, that the Meeting and Procedure Policy be amended to include "Council meetings shall be a maximum of 3 hours in length with an option to extend the meeting by a maximum of 30 minutes in special cases or an unusually long agenda" and "time set for presentations will only be extended by a motion of Council". CARRIED.

MOTION t - Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board Decision of April 25, 2013

It was moved by Councillor Hudson, seconded by Councillor Mersereau that the Town of Annapolis Royal not proceed with an appeal of the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board (NSUARB) decision of April 25, 2013 and further, not to proceed with an appeal of the Supplementary Decision dated October 3, 2013. CARRIED.

MOTION u - New Position; Planning, Heritage and Marketing Coordinator

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Hudson that Council authorize CAO St-Amour to recruit a Planning, Heritage and Marketing Coordinator to fill the new position, with salary to be commensurate with experience and qualifications as per the job description approved. CARRIED.

In search of Striped Bass on the Annapolis River

The striped bass (*M.saxatilis*), or striper, is a fish highly prized by anglers in Nova Scotia, but the fate of this species in the Bay of Fundy has come into question.

Striped bass are listed as endangered by the Committee on the Status of Endangered Wildlife in Canada (COWEWIC), and The Department of Fisheries and Oceans has indicated that there is no evidence of spawning or recruitment in the Annapolis River since the mid-seventies. With this alarming information in mind, the Clean Annapolis River Project has been working with the Striped Bass Research Collective on a research and outreach project. It has been a busy field season with samples taken from 12 seine sites on the Annapolis River and 3 on the Bear River, as well as fyke net sites on Allains Creek and the Annapolis River. To date sampling has not yielded any striped bass, and collection will continue while conditions still permit.

Information from anglers and local residents is another key component to this project. The CARP office doubles as a Striped Bass Stewardship centre, and is always open to visitors. We have log books available for anglers who are willing to record information and collect scale samples of striped bass. If you

have any information about striped bass in the Annapolis River your contribution is very important, please stop by our office or contact us by phone or e-mail.

TOWN OF ANNAPOLIS ROYAL WINTER PARKING REGULATIONS

Whereas it is necessary to make the following winter parking regulations to facilitate the removal of snow in the Town of Annapolis Royal, effective either on the first snow storm or December 01, 2013 (whichever is earlier) to April 30, 2014, between the hours of 12:00 midnight and 8:00 a.m., no person shall park or leave standing a motor vehicle upon any highway or street within the Town limits in accordance with provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act. Vehicles, whether attended or unattended, shall not be left in a position or manner which may interfere with or obstruct snow removal or winter maintenance operations. Ticketing and/or towing will occur when a parked vehicle restricts snow removal or winter maintenance operations.

Reminder to Residents:

The Town of Annapolis Royal wishes to remind residents that development and building permits are required for any construction project, regardless of size. In addition, heritage approval may be required. Whether you are renovating an existing building, constructing a new house or just putting up a baby barn, you need to obtain a permit before starting the job. Permits are required for small-scale projects such as signs, decks, porches, swimming pool fences and garden sheds, as well as for repairs, alterations, additions, or demolition of existing buildings. A development permit is also needed for a "change of use" such as a new business.

Welcome again to Valley Waste, Annapolis Royal!

It's been a month since the Town of Annapolis Royal joined Valley Waste as its 9th municipal partner and we've received a wonderfully warm welcome. It's clear from collection day that residents and businesses have been doing a fantastic job at recycling and composting. The biggest adjustment has most likely been managing a green cart in the yard and remembering that collection day is now Wednesday.

A few friendly reminders on collection days:

Have items out by 8:00 am on collection day

Garbage goes in clear bags (4 bag limit). If needed, one of these may be a solid colour bag to allow for privacy. This bag, like the others, cannot contain recycling or food waste

Papers and containers must be in separate blue bags – papers in one bag, containers in another

If cardboard can't fit inside your recycling bag, flatten and bundle to a size no larger than 3ft x 2ft x 1ft. Up to two bundles permitted per collection

To keep the green carts clean and to prevent freezing in winter, wrap food scraps in paper, boxboard (i.e. cereal boxes) or certified compostable bags
