MOTION #C2016-09-19-06: New Records Management Policy

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to approve the Records Management Policy with the following amendment to Section 9: The Designated Officer, with approval from the CAO or his/her delegate for the proposed amendments, is authorized to amend the Manual. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2016-09-19-07: Approval of staff performance appraisal tool

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Deputy Mayor Power to approve the primary recommendation from the Report for Decision from May 30, 2016 with the use of the performance appraisal tool as recommended on September 19, 2016. **Motion carried**.

MOTION #C2016-09-19-08: First Readings of amended and rescinded by-laws

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to approve the first reading of Bill 177 with 5.1A amendment, the Dog By-Law, Civic Addressing By-Law and the rescinding of the Records Management By-Law. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2016-09-19-09: Adoption of amended by-law

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to approve to adopt the revised Use of Public Property Including Communications Equipment policy. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2016-09-19-10: Suspension of Waterfront Development Committee

It was moved by Councillor Paquette, seconded by Councillor Mersereau to discharge the current members of the Waterfront Development Committee and suspend all meetings and allow the Committee to become inactive until deemed necessary to reactivate. **Motion carried.**

It was moved by Councillor Mersereau, seconded by Councillor Paquette to ratify the electronic vote held on July 20, 2016 to the following Motion 2016-07-20-01 that the CAO, on behalf of Town of Annapolis Royal Council, provide a letter of support for the Friends of the Library grant application to the Federal 'New Horizons for Seniors' Community-Based Projects Grants Program. **Motion carried.**

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Paquette to ratify the electronic vote held on August 16, 2016 to the following Motion 2016-08-16-01 to approve the Town's contribution of \$135,125 towards the Waterfront Development Project as outlined in the application submitted to ACOA under the ICF program. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2016-09-19-13: Property application

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Mersereau that Council gives the applicant at 833 St George Street heritage approval to adjust the fence to include a gate 13' x 6.56' approximately 30' from St George Street towards the house, as detailed in the application AR16-013-HER, as the character defining elements are not changing the heritage value of the building and providing the requirements of the Land Use By-Law are met. **Motion carried**. 1 Nay Vote.

MOTION #C2016-09-19-14: Property application


Updates from Town Hall







The Annapolis Royal Lions Club is celebrating its 60th Anniversary and we are pleased to present our members to the community. We have a proud tradition of providing service to our community and we are seeking new members to help those in need, the elderly, children, youth, schools, civic services, health centre, and other activities. An example of our work is our support of Diabetes Awareness Month in November. The Lions Club is joining with the Annapolis Royal Diabetes Clinic, the Health Centre, foot clinic and the Consolidated Medical Clinic in promoting the signs and effects of diabetes and the need for a current diabetes test. The theme of this year's campaign is EYES ON DIABETES-celebrated on November 14th. Testing is urgent as one in two people go undiagnosed. By 2040, 40 million people may be living with diabetes

What is DIABETES? The body needs insulin to transfer glucose to energy. When the pancreas doesn't produce insulin it is type 1 diabetes. When the pancreas doesn't produce enough insulin it is type 2 diabetes. Diabetes risk factors include family history, lack of exercise and healthy eating, being weight, high blood pressure, high glucose levels, increased age, and ethnicity.

The Annapolis Royal Lions will be presenting their annual donation to the local diabetes clinic and to Camp Maxwell Diabetes Children's Camp at our November Diabetes Night Dinner. Those folks wishing to learn more about Lions or wishing to serve the community

Infrastructure Updates: Full Steam Ahead!

Constructions, repairs and updates are underway at Fort Anne National Historic Site, in preparation for 2017 and beyond. 2017 will be a big year for Fort Anne National Historic Site. It's the 100th anniversary of the site being declared a National Historic Site, the oldest such designation in Canada. To celebrate, Fort Anne is undergoing a complete renewal of the interpretive offer in the Officers' Quarters and on the grounds.

In order to do this, there was first the challenge of removing the displays that have been in the museum since the mid-90s. Not wanting to see all of this hard work end up in a landfill, the decision was made to invite local not-for-profit organizations to come see if they could re-purpose any of the displays. What a great success that was! Every item available was claimed, first come first served, and have found new homes in the Annapolis and neighbouring communities, and only scraps from items that were not re-usable will make their way to the landfill. Our thanks go out to King's Theatre, the James House Museum, the Annapolis Heritage Society, the Historical Association of Annapolis Royal, the Historic Gardens and the Cornwallis Military Museum, all of whom made this possible.

Garrison Graveyard Stabilization – Gravestones

Maintenance is now complete on several gravestones that have been identified to be in varying states of disrepair. Parks Canada has been working hard to ensure that this cultural resource is protected for future years to come. This conservation effort, led by stone mason Heather Lawson, involved mortar work, the resetting and straightening of stones and lead capping, all of which will ensure the future preservation of the Garrison Graveyard's resources.

Queen's Wharf, Trail System and Maintenance Garage

As mentioned last month, starting in November, Parks Canada will start the process of stabilizing the remaining section of Queen's Wharf to prevent further erosion and continue to provide safe visitor access to the area. In addition to the stabilization of the wharf, a nearby trail will be built linking the town waterfront boardwalk onto the Fort Anne grounds, tying into the existing perimeter trail near Statue of De Mons. Included in this, the storage garage by the administration building will be replaced over the next few months. These three projects will near completion by March 31st, 2017.

One temporary impact related to this infrastructure work will be the use of parking spaces during the construction period, five public library parking spaces will be temporarily unavailable and an additional six Parks Canada parking spots will be unavailable during this time. We apologize for the inconvenience and appreciate your understanding and cooperation.

Archaeology – Discoveries and Progress

Before construction begins on any site, Parks Canada completes a rigorous, multi-disciplinary assessment process for all projects, including archeology and environmental impacts. With this can come some pretty interesting discoveries or bring to light history from the past.

In advance of construction of the replacement maintenance garage, work is being undertaken to ensure that archaeological resources are not lost - that they are recorded and preserved prior to construction. Some of the interesting and notable resources include:

- At the North West side of the excavated site, the archaeologist exposed the intact wooden floor of a yet undetermined building likely dated to the 18th century. The building was clearly associated with the Fort and historian Brenda Dunn will be providing further insights so stay tuned!
- Numerous artifacts including ceramics and glass dating from the 1700s and 1800s have been unearthed but nothing of significance (other than the structural remains) to this point.
- If artifacts are unearthed underneath the floor this will help to determine the date of the building. A sample of the wood will also be sent out for dating (dendrochronology).
