WHAT'S UP ANNAPOLIS?

We are excited to announce that construction on the new Library & Innovation Lab is underway. Located at the Academy, the re-designed space will feature a modern library, programming room, common room, upgraded food bank, music room, and innovation lab. The space is scheduled to open at the end of September. The gym will be available for use during the renovation project. A special thanks to Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA), Friends of the Library, Government of Nova Scotia, County of Annapolis, Annapolis Valley Regional Library, Town council and staff, and all those who supported fundraising initiatives.

For the third year in a row, the Façade Program is granting money to property owners to make improvements to buildings. This year's successful applicants will see funding toward painting, landscaping, new roofs, and general exterior improvements. A total of 14 applications were submitted, with 12 being awarded funding for a total of \$5,805.00. We want to thank everyone who applied and wish congratulations to the successful applicants. Let's keep making this town a beautiful place to be.

MAYOR'S MESSAGE



Permit first please: As Mayor, I am an ex-officio member of the Town of Annapolis Royal's Planning & Heritage Advisory Committee (PHAC). An ongoing issue of concern to PHAC members and Council and staff is the failure of property owners and business operators to obtain permits and authorization before commencing work; an area of particular concern for a town designated as a national historic district, with more than 130 designated heritage buildings. Thousands of people visit Annapolis Royal every year and comment on our quality of life amidst the beauty of our built heritage.

The incredible images of Annapolis Royal captured by professional and amateur photographers, and shared with the rest of the world, are in large part due to the dedicated preservation and protection of our cultural landscapes and inventory of historic buildings. In addition to the hard work by property owners, this is possible through related bylaws, policies, and guidelines, such as our Building and Alteration Guidelines Policy; which is for the use of homeowners, developers, architects, building contractors, and real estate agents. All play an important part in the look of our national historic district, and the preservation and protection of the built heritage within it.

Please contact Town Hall to obtain any required authorization and permits before commencing any work on a building in the Town of Annapolis Royal or installing any signage.

Notice from Public Health Agency of Canada

Lyme disease is a serious illness caused by the bite of an infected blacklegged tick. Blacklegged ticks can be active throughout much of the year, however your risk of a tick bite is highest in spring and summer.

What you can do:

- wear light coloured long-sleeved shirts and pants to spot ticks more easily
- tuck your shirt into your pants, and pull your socks over your pant legs
- use bug spray containing DEET or Icaridin on your skin and clothing (always follow the directions on the label)
- shower or bathe within two hours of being outdoors to facilitate a prompt tick check and to remove ticks that have not attached yet
- do a daily full-body check for ticks on yourself, your children, and pets
- if you find an attached tick, remove it with tweezers immediately. Removing it within 24-36 hours can help prevent infection
- see your health care provider right away if you develop symptoms of Lyme disease in the weeks after a tick bite

CHIEF'S CORNER



This month's contribution is from Acting Chief of Police, Nicole Cleaves.

With the warm weather and sunshine fast approaching it can only mean one thing; summer time is upon us. With the beautiful weather there are surely to be plenty of events scheduled in the upcoming months. These events draw an increase in foot, bicycle and motorized traffic to our quaint little town.

The members of your local police department would like to take this time to issue a friendly reminder to all town residents of the laws surrounding bicycle safety, parking, and crosswalks.

Under the Motor Vehicle Act of Nova Scotia there are certain laws specifically designed for bicycles and bicycle operators. It should be no surprise that the first thing we'd like to remind you of is that a helmet is required for all ages. This law pertains not only for bicycle operators but for all in-line skates, scooters, and skateboards. Secondly, bicycle operators must travel to the far right side of the road or road shoulder and travel in the same direction as motorized traffic. If cycling on a shared sidewalk, be advised that pedestrians have the right of way. And thirdly, bicycle riders must ride in single file.

You may have also noticed that the Annapolis Royal Public Works Department has been busy installing new 'no parking' signs around town, particularly on Church Street. Please remember that if you are parked within 5 meters of a cross walk, in front of a fire hydrant, or in an area where it is posted 'No Parking' you are in violation of the Motor Vehicle Act. A simple check of your surroundings to ensure you are legally parked will help you avoid receiving a penalty.

And last but not least, pedestrian traffic is expected to increase in the upcoming weeks. Please be mindful of pedestrians waiting to cross the street in crosswalks; and pedestrians make sure traffic has come to a stop prior to crossing. Town Hall will be closed July 2nd for Canada Day

Leaf and Yard Waste Site

The Town wishes to notify the community that the public leaf and yard waste, located at the Public Works yard, will be closing on July 1st. High disposal costs, fire risks, and use by non-residents were all contributing factors in this decision. Instead of the leaf and yard waste site, council has passed a motion to have curbside yard waste disposal service in the fall of 2018 and spring of 2019. Residents will be able to leave brush and branches curbside for collection. Dates and full details of this will be communicated in the coming months. In the interim, we want to remind residents that Valley Waste has a drop-off site in Lawrencetown that accepts yard and leaf waste.



Civic Address Signage

Do you have your civic address sign? The Civic Address By-law requires that all civic addresses have their number displayed in plain sight. Fire Chief Malcolm Francis recommends that properties use the blue reflective signs as they are highly visible at day and night. As a fundraiser initiative, the Lions Club sells the signs at Home Hardware.



Our Canine Friends

A reminder that Annapolis Royal is an on-leash area. Please keep dogs on a leash at all times, including the French Basin Trail where delicate wildlife exists. Paddy's Park is a lovely off-leash play area for dogs to frolic, located next to the skate park.

We love seeing dogs out for walks in town but please keep the town clean and pick-up after your dogs.



Plastics and Recycling

There has been much media attention regarding China no longer accepting recyclables. Valley Waste has provided clarification on the matter, explaining that the percentage of contaminated unrecyclable materials in a bale determines whether or not China accepts the recyclables (cannot be greater than 0.5%). Unrecyclable material could be plastics that are dirty (food residue) or bales of material that other types of plastics, paper, glass, metal or general garbage mixed in the bale. There are several ways steps we can all take to improve the quality of recyclable material and help keep the contamination percentage low.

- Rinse food residue off of recyclable containers
- Take paper receipts out of plastic bags
- Bags that have food residue or mud go in the regular garbage
- Keep paper and cardboard in a separate blue bag from the bag that contains recyclable plastics, cans and glass containers
- Avoid over packaged materials when possible
- Avoid lower grade plastics when possible (typically plastics numbered 3, 6 & 7)
- Use reusable alternatives.

COUNCIL MOTIONS

Council May 22, 2018 (From Unapproved Minutes. Approval of minutes will occur at the next Council Meeting)

MOTION #C2018-MAY-22-03

It was moved by Councillor Sanford, seconded by Councillor Elliot to ratify the electronic motion #2018-05-01-01, held May 5, 2018, that Council approve the recommendation from Hatch to award the Library and Innovation Lab tender (Tender No. 17-353541B) to Roscoe Construction Limited in the amount of \$481,963 + HST. **Motion carried.**
