MAYOR'S MESSAGE





September 9, 2018 was a remarkable day in Annapolis Royal, as numerous dignitaries, Lewis family members, special guests, and a hundred onlookers gathered with myself and members of Town Council to honour the memory of Dr. Daurene E. Lewis, CM, who became the first black female mayor in Canada when elected mayor of Annapolis Royal in 1984. Lewis passed away in 2013, and September 9, 2018 marked the 75th anniversary of her birth in Annapolis Royal.

A community initiative to raise funds for the commissioning of a bronze portrait of Lewis by celebrated Canadian sculptor Ruth Abernethy was launched to coincide with International Women's Day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. Among the many accomplishments in her life of excellence, Lewis was Director of the Centre for Women in Business at

Mount Saint Vincent University; Principal of Nova Scotia Community College's Institute of Technology and Akerley Campus; served on the Board of Directors of Canada Post; the Governor General's Order of Canada Advisory Council; the Executive of the Vanderbilt Institute of the Family; the Maritime Conservatory of Performing Arts; and was a Member of the International Women's Foundation.

Dr. Daurene E. Lewis, CM was also a recipient of the Order of Canada, the United Nations Global Citizenship Award, the Progress Club of Halifax Woman of Excellence Award for Public Affairs & Communication, and is on the Nova Scotia Black Cultural Centre's Wall of Honour. A truly remarkable women,

whose life will serve as an inspiration for generations of people for centuries to come. The bronze portrait of Lewis was unveiled by her nephew, Dr. Peter Nkansah, assisted by



CHIEF'S CORNER

As we move into fall, our daylight will be reduced as will our visibility on roads, so, a friendly reminder to get into the fall and winter driving mentality and prepare your vehicle for winter conditions. I would also like to remind you that studded tires are permitted between October 14th-April 30th of each year.

A short year ago I attended the annual Nova Scotia Chiefs of Police Conference and spoke about the pending legalization of cannabis. It was once again a hot topic at this year's conference as legalization will occur on October 17th. Having heard from Premier McNeil, Minister Fury, and other Department of Justice officials, I feel we are in a good position within Nova Scotia as we move forward into the legalization of cannabis. Like anything else, there will be growing pains, however, this is to be expected. Due to considerable research and public input the federal and Nova Scotia provincial governments have created new laws (Federal – *Cannabis*

Act, Provincial – Cannabis Control Act) to properly regulate cannabis in addition to making changes to existing federal and provincial statutes related to the use, possession, and cultivation of cannabis. The Criminal Code in particular will deal with impaired driving by drug or combined drug and alcohol. More specific to Nova Scotia, the sale of recreational cannabis versus medicinal cannabis will be limited to authorized distributors through the Nova Scotia Liquor Commission. The use and possession of cannabis will be limited to those 19 years and older in private locations such as a residential property (rental properties may be restricted by the property owners – check with them), and

public locations that are specifically authorized or do not conflict with the *Smoke Free Places Act* (see link at https://novascotia.ca/smoke-free-places/ for more details). Each residence may grow up to four plants but again, this may be prohibited by owners of properties to those who rent. Individuals may only possesses up to 30 grams of cannabis outside of their residence. The use in any motor vehicle while under the influence is prohibited. Violations of a provincial law will be dealt with by way of a Summary Offence Ticket, much the same way as a traffic violation versus a Federal Criminal Code offence as before. Any violations of Federal statute may result in criminal charges. On a different note, there will be two remembrance ceremonies taking place in October/ November. One is the Provincial Police and Peace Officer Memorial Ceremony to be held in Halifax on Sunday, October 21. The other is of course, Remembrance Day. Please take a moment to remember those who gave their lives for your freedom and way of life, including those who may suffer from injures they received providing that service.





Commercial Compost Initiative

Council is pleased to announce a pilot commercial compost program for businesses.

The Town has been investigating options to help alleviate the compost issues that occur during the busier months. A cost effective and convenient service has been found as a possible solution.

EFR Environmental is able to provide supplemental commercial compost collection in addition to the regular Valley Waste collection. The service will be offered on alternate weeks to regular Valley Waste collection. Council passed a motion to cover half of the service cost so that businesses who partake will only pay \$7.25 + HST/cart per collection. This fee includes the supply of a cart, pick-up, and disposal of compost.

If your business is interested, we ask that you contact Amy at admin@annapolisroyal.com or 902-532-2043 with details of how many carts per pick-up (a set number is required), business name, address, and contact details.

This is a trial initiative for the 2019 tourist season and will begin mid-May and run until mid-October. We encourage all businesses that generate large quantities of compost to sign up for this inexpensive option.



Winter Parking

Winter parking regulations are as follows: effective either on the first snow storm or December 01, 2018 (whichever is earlier) to April 30, 2019, during the hours of 12am-8am, no person shall park or leave standing a motor vehicle upon any highway or street within the Town limits in accordance with provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act.

Vehicles, whether attended or unattended, shall not be left in a position or manner which may interfere with or obstruct snow removal or winter maintenance operations. Ticketing and/or towing will occur when a parked vehicle restricts snow removal or winter maintenance operations.

COUNCIL MOTIONS



Council September 17, 2018 (From Unapproved Minutes. Approval of minutes will occur at the next Council Meeting)

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-03

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford to ratify the electronic motion #2018-08-01, held August 8, 2018; that Council authorize staff to apply to the Ministry of Communities, Culture and Heritage for funding in support of the Daurene E. Lewis Memorial. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-04

It was moved by Councillor Sanford, seconded by Councillor Elliot to ratify the electronic motion #2018-09-07-01, held September 7, 2018; that Council authorize Chief Moser to proceed with hiring a Police Constable on a one year term basis as stated in the attached job posting. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-05

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford, on recommendation from the Valley Waste Board of Directors, that Council approve the supplemental budget to reallocate funds to cover the additional costs associated with the cessation of service to Annapolis County. **Motion carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-06

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Kinsella to approve the Capital Investment Plan for the next five years beginning in 2018, as amended. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-07

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford to direct staff to compile a list of businesses in town that are interested in supplemental compost collection and implement an additional commercial compost program through EFR Environmental, with participating businesses being responsible for paying 50 percent of the service fees and the Town will pay the remaining 50 percent. The program will be on a trial basis and begin mid-May 2019 and run through mid-October 2019. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-08

It was moved by Councillor Sanford, seconded by Councillor Elliot council to approve the 2017/2018 audited financial statements as presented. Motion Carried.

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-09

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford that council accepts the adoption of the Travel Policy as presented, with an effective date of October 1, 2018. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-10

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Kinsella to approve the Municipal Emergency Management Mutual Aid Agreement between the Annapolis REMO and the Municipality of the District of Digby and the Town of Digby as presented. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-11

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford to appoint Kenneth Knox as the Town of Annapolis Royal representative on Housing Nova Scotia's Western Nova Scotia Housing Board. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-12

It was moved by Councillor Sanford, seconded by Councillor Elliot that Council reimburse Jacob Tanner Developments for the appraisal cost of ARRA in the amount \$2500.00 plus HST, 22% of the Chubb Edwards Security Invoice (total \$1964.50) which is \$432.19 plus HST, and 1/39th of the costs incurred for establishing the condo corporation (total \$63,716.70) which is \$1633.76 inclusive of HST. This motion is made without prejudice. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-14

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Kinsella that without intending, in any way, to release or otherwise limit the liability or responsibility of any one or more current or former members of VWRM to contribute to or guarantee the accrued indebtedness of VWRM, Council guarantees the CIBC Line of Credit, in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 with the Town of Annapolis Royal Share being 1.00% or \$10,000.00 as outlined in the percentage cost sharing table provided in the VWRM correspondence of August 22, 2018. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-15

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford to approve the Draft Agreement between the Town of Annapolis Royal and Valley African Nova Scotia Development Association for the Rose Fortune Interpretive Panel. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-16

It was moved by Councillor Sanford, seconded by Councillor Elliot that the Environment Advisory Committee meet once a month. Motion Carried.

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-17

It was moved by Councillor Elliot, seconded by Deputy Mayor Power that Council participate and support the letter from the Town of Shelburne regarding the disaster mitigation and adaption fund. **Motion Carried.**

MOTION #C2018-SEPT-17-18

It was moved by Deputy Mayor Power, seconded by Councillor Kinsella that Council gives the applicant at 324 St. George Street heritage approval to install a wall sign on the side of the building as detailed in the application AR18-025-HER, providing the requirements of the Land Use By-Law are met. **Motion Carried.**

It was moved by Councillor Kinsella, seconded by Councillor Sanford that Council gives that the applicant at 302 St. George Street heritage approval to install a projecting wall sign, as detailed in the application AR18-026-HER, providing the requirements of the Land Use By-Law are met. **Motion Carried.**
