October is Lions World Vision Awareness Month. Lions have been advocating for the blind and visually impaired since 1925 when Helen Keller inspired lions to be their champion. World sight Day is celebrated on October 11th and October 15th is international Worldwide Care Day. The Annapolis Royal Lions Club gives an annual donation to the NS Branch of the CNIB, the QEII Health Centre and Victoria General Eye Care Centre. The Club also collects used eye-glasses – last year we turned in over 600 pairs. Children and seniors have also received help with the purchase of new eyeglasses.

On October 24th the United Nations celebrate their partnership with Lions Club International by hosting a day long event at the UN headquarters in New York called "Lions Day at the UN". 

CHIEF'S CORNER

Fall is now here and unfortunately so is daylight savings time thus shorter day times. This also means that more traffic and pedestrians are moving about in lower light or darker conditions. Not only do we need to be prepared for this but also a friendly reminder to prepare yourself and vehicle(s) for the approaching winter conditions. We all know that planning is critical particularly related to extreme weather such as Hurricane DORIAN. Also, please be reminded that studded tires are permitted between 14 October and 30 April.

I recently attended the Nova Scotia Chiefs of Police and Governance Board Conference where Minister Furey spoke about provincial priorities. These are not new but thought I would share them with you. The priorities are part of a provincial funding model, which

allows the provincial government to provide direction and focus on some of the issues affecting policing services to Nova Scotians including: Human Trafficking; Sexual Exploitation, Domestic Violence, Impaired Driving (Drug and Alcohol), and Racially Biased Policing. As you may have heard, Minister Furey placed a moratorium on street checks although this is not something our agency had been doing. Along with these priorities, specialized units have been formed and are available for all provincial law enforcement agencies when dealing with any types of these Investigations. Members of the Annapolis Royal Police have also received additional training related to domestic violence, impaired driving, cannabis legislation, sexual assault investigations, and racially biased policing with additional training to be taken related to drug impaired driving. Speaking of Cannabis; edibles, extracts, and topicals will become legal on October 16, 2019, however, will not be available until December 15, 2019 due to the 60-day waiting period for Health Canada to authorize the products.

Finally, I would like to remind you of two remembrance ceremonies taking place during this time period. One is the provincial police and peace officer memorial ceremony to be held in Halifax on Sunday, October 20th. The other is of course Remembrance Day. Please take a moment to remember those who gave their lives for your freedom and way of life including those who may suffer from injures they received providing that service.

Have a safe and happy Thanksgiving and Halloween paying particular attention to latter by keeping a watchful eye for the little ghost and goblins who will be out trick or treating!



Elm Tree Alert

We appreciate the intensive clean up that has been done the last couple of weeks!

This is just a reminder that elm tree brush and debris has to be treated with caution. Annapolis Royal still has many large healthy elm trees and all of them are under constant threat of Dutch Elm disease. The Elm bark beetle is very attracted to elm debris and can breed in it and multiply, then transmit the fungus and threaten the other elm trees.

Therefore please do not store/ use elm firewood in Town. All brush needs to be chipped, burned or taken far out of Town where there are no elm trees.

All remaining stumps need to be removed, chipped or debarked.

Thank you so much for your understanding and support, so that we don't loose any more trees!


MOTION #C2019-JULY-15-16
