




MAYOR'S MESSAGE



What's happening with Climate Change?

The Town and the Environment Committee have been working on a draft climate change plan for several months and hope to put a preliminary draft before Council in September. As you can appreciate, this is a complex area and one that the Town will need a lot of help with from existing and potential partners as well as experts in various fields. One of the most important elements of the plan will involve public consultation and the Town has been successful in securing 50% of the amount needed to hire a climate change intern to assist with this and other aspects of the plan which include:

- 1. To identify what options are available for the Town and area to mitigate against and adapt to the impact of rising sea levels.
- 2. To identify practical and feasible options from the list of options identified with external advice and assistance from experts in the field (scientific and engineering).
- 3. To engage local high school students from the AWEC Environment Committee in the creation and delivery of an inclusive public information and campaign to generate public interest and engage the public in the discussion. Deliverables include:
 - Campaign slogan(s)
 - Campaign logo
 - Inclusive communications plan including target publics, best way to reach them, tailored key messages for the various publics identified
 - Campaign materials (posters, flyers, social media, mail drop, email, Town webpage and Facebook page, Instagram, text, etc.)
- 4. To engage the public in a discussion about the mitigation and adaptation options available and the range of choices available.
- 5. To incorporate public feedback into the climate change plan for the Town of Annapolis Royal and its partner municipal units.
- 6. To assist in identifying possible sources of assistance and funding for financing the plan.

This grant (\$25,000) came from the Clean Foundation's Science Horizons Internship Program. It is hoped that a second grant application to the Province of Nova Scotia's Community Works Program will provide the rest of the funding required for this position (another \$25,000). The draft climate change plan is considered a work in progress and it is expected that the plan will evolve as new information comes in and as new opportunities for funding present themselves.

And don't forget the Beyond Oqwa'titek event planned for September 10 to 12. "Beyond Oqwa'titek" is a series of educational and cultural events that will mark Mi'kmaw and early Scottish contact, and the later arrival of the Gaels. As we acknowledge the 400th Anniversary of the Charter of Nova Scotia (New Scotland), we will be exploring our colonial past, focusing particularly on Indigenous communities as well as other early settler communities, and celebrating the uniqueness and diversity of the cultures of the peoples who have inhabited these lands over time. What is Beyond Ogwa'titek?

Taking its inspiration from the Mi'kmaw word meaning 'when they arrived', Beyond Oqwa'titek, is a series of educational and cultural events that will mark Mi'kmaw and early Scottish contact, and the later arrival of the Gaels. As we acknowledge the 400th Anniversary of the Charter of Nova Scotia (New Scotland), we will be exploring our past in the spirit of "A Dialogue of Place and Diversity." We will reflect upon the impact and the legacy of colonialism particularly on Indigenous communities, as well as other early settler communities, and celebrate the uniqueness and diversity of the cultures of the peoples that have inhabited these lands over time.



The event has been organized by Parks Canada, the Town of Annapolis Royal, Mapannapolis, a committed group of local volunteers, and funded by generous grants from Canadian Heritage, Communities Culture and Heritage of Nova Scotia, and with special thanks to the L'sitkuk First Nation. Support has also been received from the Office of Gaelic Affairs, and participating organizations such as KAIROS, the Stoney Bear Singers, the Federation for Scottish Culture in Nova Scotia, and many others.

The weekend will feature a series of events which are meant to educate, entertain, help us remember, and envision a future together. The opening ceremonies will feature short remarks by the Lieutenant Governor and other local dignitaries, followed by a bannock ceremony, Pow Wow performers and Highland dancers. There will also be a ceilidh, Indigenous short films, a world food market, a Procession of Remembrance, talks about archeology, and a Kirkin o' the Tartan. It's a lot to fit in, and it all promises to be an exciting family event.

<u>International Week of the Deaf People 2021 and</u> <u>International Day of Sign Languages 2021</u>

September 20th to 26th marks the International Week of the Deaf People and International Day of Sign Languages which is an initiative of the World Federation of the Deaf (WFD) that was first launched in 1958 in Rome, Italy. It is celebrated annually by the global Deaf Community during the last full week of September to commemorate the same month the World Congress of the WFD was first held.

The International Week of the Deaf People is celebrated through various activities by Deaf Communities all around the world. These activities and events welcome the participation of all members of deaf communities, which include families of deaf people, professional and accredited sign language interpreters, peers, as well as the involvement of various stakeholders such as national governments, national and international human rights organizations, and Organizations of Persons with Disabilities. This is the only week in a year that sees highly concerted global advocacy to raise awareness about the Deaf Community on different levels. It is about gathering together, becoming united, and showing that unity to the rest of the world.

This year's themes are "Celebrating Thriving Deaf Communities" and "We Sign for Human Rights".

Personal Safety Tips

When combined with everyday common sense, the following crime prevention pointers from the Annapolis Royal Police Service can help make personal crime proofing a way of life:

General:

- Trust your instincts. If your sixth sense tells you to be wary, pay attention.
- Remember to report any crimes or serious activities you experience and/or witness.

Walking/Travel:

- Inform others when and where you are going and check in with them when you reach your destination.
- Walk with a purpose. Be always alert and attentive of your surroundings.
- Be careful where you walk. Avoid lonely or unlit streets and shortcuts through parks and/or vacant lots. Walk on the curb side, away from alleys and doorways.
- If you suspect you are being followed, cross the street, go to the nearest house, or store and call
 the police.
- When taking public transit alone, avoid waiting or getting off at isolated stations/stops. Arrange for a family member or friend to escort you to and from the station.
- It is dangerous to hitchhike and to involve yourself with strangers who are hitching a ride.
- Once trapped inside a car, it is difficult to call for assistance.

At Home:

- If you live alone, use first initials only on mailboxes, apartment directories or in the telephone directory.
- Entrances and garages should be well lit.
- Don't let strangers into your house. Insist on proper identification from service personnel. If someone asks to use your phone, offer to make the call for them instead.
- If you feel menaced in a one-on-one situation, act at once, even if it means leaving your home.
- Never admit on the telephone or at your door that you are alone.
- Never stay alone in apartment laundry rooms, mail rooms or garages.
- If you return home to find that your windows and/or doors have been tampered with, DO NOT ENTER OR CALL OUT. Go to a neighbor's home and call the police.

In Public:

- Exercise caution when conversing with people you have just met. Avoid giving your name, address and/or place of employment.
- It is risky to accept a ride home and/or invitation for a from someone you have just met.

The Nova Scotia Utility & Review Board's Hearing for the Annapolis Tidal Generating Station is September 13th. The Town's NSPI Task Team has submitted the information requests to be answered at the hearing.

As you are aware, Nova Scotia Power (NSP) has advised that it has undertaken an analysis of the operation of the Annapolis Tidal Generating Station and has determined that it is the lowest cost option and in the best interests of customers, to retire the facility. With the fate of the Tidal Power Plant being unknown, this may be the final year the Town will receive the grant in lieu of taxes from the tidal power NSPI.

The Town will ensure to provide an update on the outcome of the hearing.

Town Hall will be closed Monday, September 6th for Labour Day.



Just a friendly reminder that in-person meetings at Town Hall will be starting in September. The gathering limit in Council Chambers is 13 people; anyone is welcomed to attend meetings but it is a first come, first serve basis. National Day of Truth & Reconciliation

As you may be aware, the government recently passed legislation to make September 30th a federal statutory holiday called the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. The day is intended to educate and remind Canadians about the history of residential schools, honor the victims, and celebrate the survivors. The establishment of the national holiday is in response to the 80th call to action in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action.

So, every September 30th, Canadians will commemorate the tragic legacy of residential schools meaning that federally regulated workplaces will be closed in order to respect the new statutory holiday. This may present itself as a day of quiet reflection or participation in a community event. We must pay tribute to the survivors of residential schools, their families, and communities, and ensure that commemoration of the history and legacy of residential schools remains a vital component of the reconciliation process.

We have applied for financial assistance from the Minister of Municipal Affairs and the Nova Scotia Emergency Management Office (NSEMO). Both requests were denied. It is our hopes that with the newly elected government that we will reapply and be offered funding. Staff are continuously working to find support to help us due to the unforeseen water emergency.

Please come and experience live and in person, the Music, the Dance, and the Stories, passed down from those that came before us. This event is sure to please everyone, and awaken the imagination.

Bannock is a fried bread introduced by the Scots and adopted by many Indigenous peoples of Canada. Its name comes from the Gaelic word "bannach", which means "morsel". It can be made with a multitude of ingredients and in a variety of ways, and became a staple in many Indigenous communities. This ceremony will be a literal "breaking of bread" symbolizing the good-faith coming together of communities as we examine our past.


