Are you listening? The closer we get to summer, the more sounds we are hearing. From Spring Peepers to returning migratory birds, and maybe the occasional raccoon or skunk looking for some of your leftovers! Remember to keep your waste somewhere critter-proof. This is also the time of year when birds are nesting and spring babies are being born. We ask that everyone do their best to not disturb wildlife during this time and leave space for the parents and babies whenever possible. If you happen across any injured, distressed or orphaned wildlife, please contact Hope for Wildlife's Wildlife Helpline, 7:00 am to 8:00 pm, seven days a week, call or text 902-407-9453. Avian flu is still active in Nova Scotia, if you come across dead birds, contact DNRR at 902-584-2229 for removal. Although they can be cute, many animals can also become a nuisance. MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Protecting our downtown against sea level rise

The Town just received word that it will receive \$25,000 from the National Cost Sharing Program for Heritage Places towards engineering services to identify the best options for protecting the downtown core from sea level rise. The Chair of the Environment Committee, John Bottomley, recently completed a comprehensive Flood Risk Assessment report based on past climate change studies and reports conducted over the years which has an estimated in-kind value of \$40,000. The Committee will be meeting with a representative from Parks Canada to discuss the go forward plan which includes tendering for engineering services. There is substantial federal money available for a solution, but we must first confirm the best solution for the Town and the area.

The Environment Committee now has a representative from the Municipality of the County of Annapolis, Councillor Clyde Barteaux, and it is anticipated that the Town of Middleton will be appointing a representative soon if it has not already done so. So, for anyone with an interest in our downtown, and there are so many of you, please think about how you might be able to contribute towards identifying a solution for our downtown.

40 Years Forward Survey

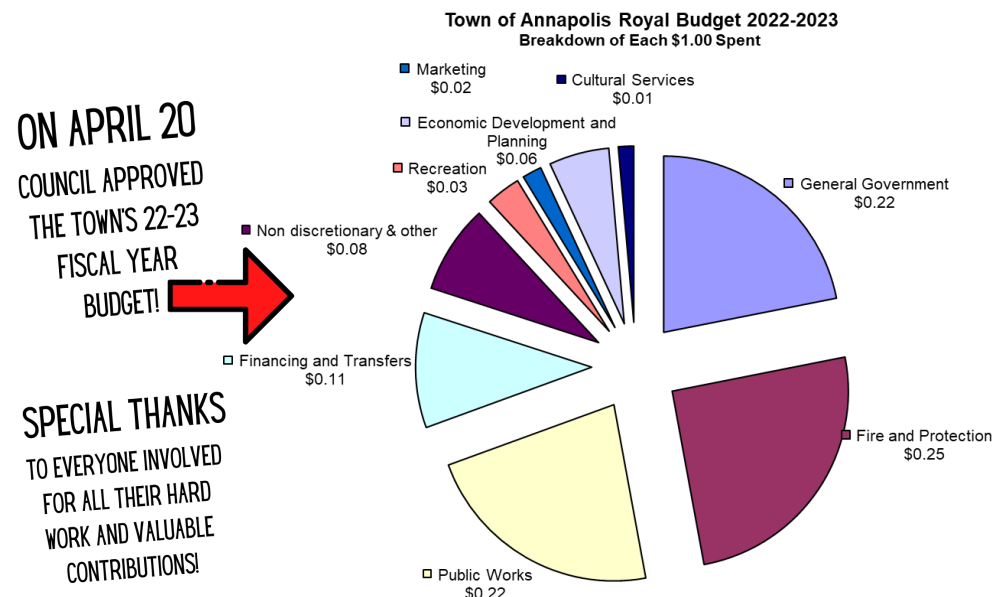

Ick... it's a Tick!

We generally think of blooming flowers, leaves on trees and the soothing sounds of the Spring Peepers in May. But May is also the start of tick season. Did you know there are 14 kinds of ticks in Nova Scotia? The ones we humans most often come across are the Wood (Dog) tick and the Black Legged (Deer) tick. The Deer Tick is the only one reported to carry and transmit Lyme Disease. As icky as they are, it is wise to become tick-aware to lessen risk of disease and the heebie-jeebies!

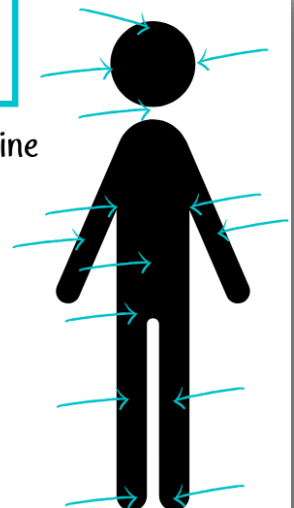

Elder Abuse & Safety Tips part 2 Prevention Suggestions for Older Persons

Do:

- Plan for your own future when you are well and still independent
- Make a will and review it annually
- Have your pension and other cheques deposited directly into your account
- Stay active in your community for as long as possible



Don't:

- Revise a will without careful thought and before speaking to someone you trust
- Leave jewellery, cash, or other valuable possessions lying around your home
- Rely solely on family members for your social life and care
- Allow adult children to return to your home (especially if they have drug, alcohol and/or psychological problems) without carefully considering the situation and consulting others for advice
- Be too proud to ask for help when you need it (i.e. public health nurse, church, senior centre, friends)
- Be intimidated in seeking your rights because of your age

Privacy Protection Part 1

Protecting your personal privacy is of vital importance in an age where incidents of identity theft are on the rise. The following tips, offered by the Annapolis Royal Police Service, are designed to help individuals from becoming victims of privacy crime:

Documents and Mail:

- Keep all your receipts and reconcile them with your statements
- Ensure that all items containing personal information such as charge receipts, bank statements, etc. are disposed of safely
- Always shred receipts, copies of credit card applications, insurance forms and physician statements
- Never leave receipts at bank machines, bank wickets, in trash cans or at gas-line pumps
- Pay close attention to billing and mailing cycles
- Put outgoing mail in post office collection boxes
- Promptly remove mail from your mailbox upon delivery
- If you are going to be away from home, ask a trusted friend or neighbour to pick-up your mail or have Canada Post activate a 'hold mail' service
- Avoid mail solicitations disguised as promotions that request personal information

Notes, Notices and Updates from Town Hall

- The Town has adopted **two new policies**: *Videoconferencing* and *Fees and Fines*. The Low Income Tax Exemption Policy has also been updated to reflect changes to income level. All policies can be found at <https://annapolisroyal.com/town-hall/policies-and-by-laws/>
- Town Council approved 2nd reading and passing of the Regional Emergency Management By-law at the March 16, 2022 Town Council meeting. This by-law becomes law as of April 14, 2022.
- **Public Hearing** on May 18 in Council Chambers regarding the request to deregister the heritage property at 634 St. George St.
- Ken Knox has been appointed Municipal Development Officer, term ending December 31, 2022.

Adaptation and Mitigation


Mitigation enables communities to create disaster prevention strategies to help prevent or reduce the impact of natural disasters. In addition, mitigation enables individuals and communities to recover more rapidly from extreme environmental events. Two examples of mitigation strategies include planting trees to fight greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Also, creating farm crops that diversify produce and promote healthy ecosystems and soils.



ADAPTATION:

Being aware of and prepared for climate change related events & impacts

- protection and storage of water supply to address drought
- preparing for longer, more intense fire seasons
- updating or installing infrastructure to address sea level rise
- development of community emergency or disaster plans
- protecting farms and food chain
- climate justice for people & places



MITIGATION:

To limit climate change by reducing greenhouse gas emissions

- retrofit homes & building with energy efficient devices
- adopt renewable energy production - solar, wind, etc.
- implement sustainable & active transportation - electric vehicles, bio fuels, bike lanes, etc.
- adopt sustainable land use practices

Mitigation is vital to help communities fight climate change and think long-term about the potential of environmental threats and ways to lower its impacts.

On the other hand, adaptation helps communities prepare for the direct impacts of climate change. For example, adverse effects from climate change will create higher intensity and frequency in extreme environmental events such as floods, heatwaves, and hurricanes. Communities prepared for such circumstances will better protect their social, ecological and economic assets. Two examples of adaptation strategies include improvements to emergency response measures. Public engagement on information/education surrounding threats the area may face due to climate change.



World Bee Day

We have all heard the phrase, “It takes a village to raise a child”. We could also say, “It takes a bee to feed a child.” For several years now, we have been hearing reports of declining populations of honeybees, bumble bees, and other pollinating insects. To obtain the large amounts of nectar and pollen required for survival, these insects visit millions of blossoms in a season. While foraging, they act as agents of pollination, providing a vital service to agriculture, estimated to be worth 10-20 times the value of the honey and beeswax they produce.

As a child, I had my first close encounter with honeybees. I still remember the pleasure of sneaking into my grandfathers "Honey House" and breathing deeply the rich aroma of freshly extracted honey. That memory was renewed, when 50 years later, I purchased some honeybees of my own, and the wood-ware to house them. I felt the same excitement that I had when I was seven.

Honeybees, and their kin are worth celebrating. Without them our children would have no apples for lunch, nor oranges in their Christmas stockings. World Bee Day provides a good opportunity for each of us to consider steps we can take to help and protect these insects that play such a vital role in keeping us healthy and filling our minds with wonder.

The World Health Organization (WHO) announced the 2022 global campaign for World No Tobacco Day - "Tobacco: Threat to our environment." The campaign is aimed to raise awareness among the public on the environmental impact of tobacco – from cultivation, production, distribution, and waste. WHO also notes:

- 84 megatons of carbon dioxide (greenhouse gas) equivalent emitted annually.
- 3.5 million hectares of land destroyed, deforested and degraded by tobacco farming.
- 90% of tobacco farms/plantations are in developing countries that are less equipped to address long term consequences like food insecurity, loss of biodiversity, healthcare/illness, and poverty. Tobacco industry profits are made by transnational companies, not the countries in which the tobacco is grown.
- The tobacco industry contributes to climate change and reduces climate resilience, wasting resources and damaging ecosystems. Source: <https://bit.ly/36nGObl>

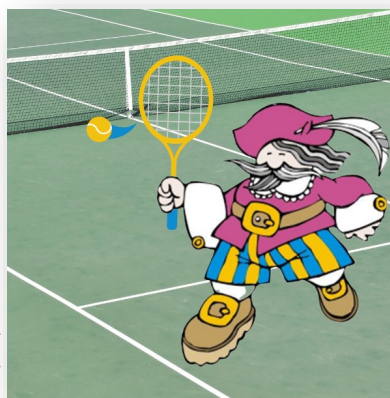
Summer Tennis is Annapolis Royal

IMPORTANT NOTICE: DOG BYLAW NOW IN EFFECT

We would like to advise the public that, the Town of Annapolis Royal "Dog By-law" has now received Ministerial approval. This By-law was signed and published on October 7th 2020. Starting April 11th 2022, any offence violated under this by-law will carry a minimum out of court penalty of \$312.25. The following Offences will be enforced by way of Summary Offence Ticket:

- ◆ Owning unregistered dog(s)
- ◆ Owning dog(s) that is/are not wearing tag
- ◆ Owner of dog neglecting or refusing to provide written statement of number of dogs owned, harboured, or kept on owner's premises
- ◆ Owning dog(s) that runs at large
- ◆ Owning dog(s) that persistently disturbs quiet neighborhood
- ◆ Owner harboring, keeping, or having care or control of dangerous dog(s)
- ◆ Owner failing to remove dog's feces from property other than owner's property
