On August 24, I attended briefing for mayors and wardens on the Province's Housing Strategy. The Province is following through on the recommendations of Affordable Housing Commission's 2021 Report and says that it wants to support municipalities to complete a housing needs assessment beginning this year and ending in the spring of 2023.

Your Input Needed

A public survey will be conducted between September and November this year. There is a communications plan which includes posters with QR codes, social media posts, regional libraries, and a list of stakeholders.

There will be an email to municipal units with discussion points in preparation for workshops where people will be able to talk about experiences in our own community. Then, on September 21, 2022, Statistics Canada will be releasing key housing data that will feed into the process.

The deliverables include a "what we heard" report, infographics, and an interactive online data tool. People will be able to access and find information on their own community and

regional data as well by going to mountainmath.ca for the census mapper. An interim report is expected by the spring of 2023.

So please stay tuned so that you can have your say on issues relating to the availability and affordability of housing in our area.

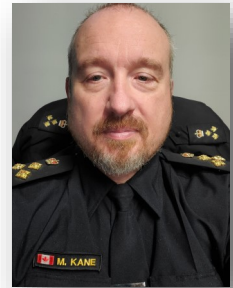

Identity Theft Part 3

Credit Cards:

Losing credit cards or having them stolen can be aggravating and costly. People should be aware that credit card fraud is a serious crime for which everyone pays.

The Annapolis Royal Police Service offers the following series of useful tips that may help prevent you or a family member from becoming a victim of credit card crime:

- Report lost or stolen cards to the card issuer(s) and to the police immediately. This allows the issuer(s) to take the necessary measures to prevent fraudulent use of your card(s).
- Keep an accurate and up-to-date list of all credit cards, their account numbers, expiry dates and issuers' phone numbers so that you can quickly report missing cards. Remember to keep this list in a secure place.
- Never volunteer your card number to callers who tell you that you have won a trip or prize or are eligible to receive a free gift. This could result in unauthorized charges to your account.
- Avoid leaving credit cards or other valuables in a locker at recreational facilities and other public places even if it can be locked
- Never leave credit cards in a car or any other vehicle. Many cards are stolen from glove compartments.
- Never lend your credit card to anyone
- Sign new credit cards as soon as you receive them and destroy expired ones
- Protect all your cards, including those issued by phone companies, grocery store chains, discount stores, etc. that would enable someone to charge goods and services in your name

Property Identification

As a rule, burglars do not like handling marked property because it is difficult to dispose of and can be easily traced. Help deter thieves from stealing your property and assist ARPD to return your recovered stolen property by:

- recording serial numbers and model numbers in a secure place
- take photos or videos of your valuables
- keep valuables in a locked safe – bolted to the wall or floor
- record unique markings or damage to your valuables
- mark your valuables with an engraver, permanent stencil or microdot technology tool.

Sep 6, 1962 - The first CBC and Radio-Canada television stations begin operating in Montréal, Sep 8, the CBC station CBLT will go on the air in Toronto

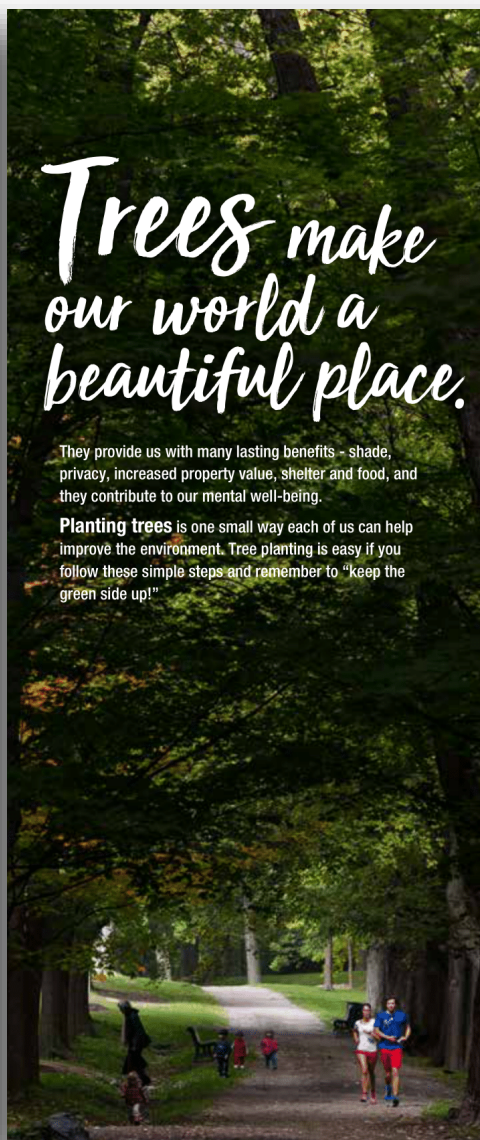
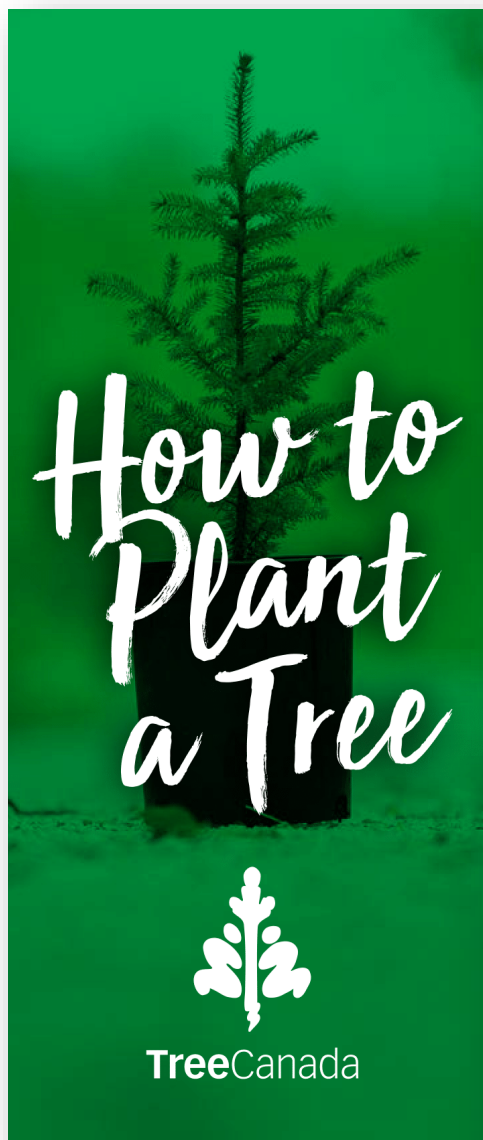
Sep 11, 2001 - Gander airport in Newfoundland and Labrador receives thousands of passengers after terrorists use airliners to attack the World Trade Center in New York

Sep 16, 1974 - 32 women, the first female cohort, join the RCMP

Sep 17, 1878 - The secret ballot is used for the first time in a federal general election

Sep 20, 1917 - Parliament of Canada passes legislation giving some women the right to vote in federal elections, women 21 years of age or older; and the wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter of any person, living or dead, who had served in the military. Another law grants the right to vote to some 2,000 military nurses, known as "Bluebirds," stationed in Europe. After the 1917 election, the government will extend this right to all non-Indigenous Canadians who are British subjects and 21 years of age or older.

Sep 29, 1962 - The satellite Alouette 1 is launched marking Canada's entry into the space age. Canada is the third country to design and build its own satellite. Over 10 years, Alouette 1 will produce more than 1 million images of the ionosphere




PLAN AHEAD

Think about what the tree will look like at maturity. How tall will it grow? What shape will it have? Will it fit in the space you have once it is full-grown? Would a coniferous (evergreen) or deciduous tree work better in your landscape?

A tree's shape, height, size at maturity and function in your landscape will determine the best tree to plant in a particular location.

Before doing any digging, make sure to request underground utility locates to check for buried cables and wires on your property. Call your local municipality to learn who to contact and do not plant tall-growing trees close to overhead utility lines.

Tree Canada encourages planting native species appropriate to your local climate, light, soil, moisture conditions, and space availability.

WHEN TO PLANT




DECIDUOUS trees can be planted in the spring, as soon as the frost is out of the ground, or in the fall, from leaf-fall until freeze-up.

CONIFERS can be planted early in the spring until four weeks after deciduous trees have opened their leaves, or in the fall, from about the first week of August to the end of October.

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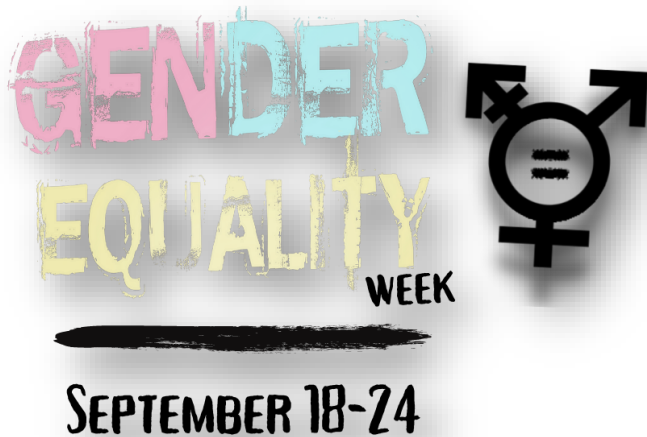
Trees are Cool!

Trees provide numerous benefits for humans and their ecosystems, they have their own communication networks, they can live for decades, hundreds, and some even for thousands of years! Trees provide shade - shade that can keep you cool and reduce your air conditioning needs, cool land and aquatic animal habitats, block heat absorption of materials in the built environment (asphalt, concrete, etc.) helping to keep communities cooler. Trees provide insulation and shelter - conifers can help keep homes warmer in winter, many animals find homes in trees. Trees provide food and medicine - nuts, berries, fruit, sap, aspirin and chemotherapy drugs to name a few. Trees provide enjoyment - climbing, swinging, sitting under and reading, forest bathing and more. Trees provide employment - artists and artisans, foresters, farmers, carpenters and craftspeople, mills and trades, tourism and so on. Trees reduce pollution - they can capture and store carbon, they can also prevent soil erosion and thus help reduce water contaminants. Trees provide solace - stress reduction and help improve mood and mental well-being, help speed healing, reconnect humans with nature, culture and traditions, one large tree can provide oxygen for up to four people! This Fall spend some time with the trees, in your yard, your community, out on the trails or parks. You'll be happy you did.

Prohibited grounds of discrimination

Section 3 (1) For all purposes of this Act, the prohibited grounds of discrimination are race, national or ethnic origin, colour, religion, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, marital status, family status, genetic characteristics, disability and conviction for an offence for which a pardon has been granted or in respect of which a record suspension has been ordered.

It's That Time of Year - Back to School!

Many kids and parents are excited. Parents may get a little time to themselves and kids get to catch up with old friends and make new ones.

It a time for parents and guardians to review school bus safety with their children. How to cross the street safely, remaining seated while the bus is moving, not to distract the driver, keep all your limbs inside the bus, do not block the aisle and always listen to the bus driver.

Its also a time for motorists to reacquaint themselves with the rules of the road and school bus safety. For the safety of the children, DO NOT pass a school bus when it is stopped with its lights flashing and stop sign open. A first offence under the Motor Vehicle Act for passing a stopped school bus carries a \$410 fine and six demerit points on your driver's license. For subsequent offences, the fine increases to \$1272.50.

PLANTING Steps

MINIMIZE STRESS TO YOUR TREES

Protect your tree well during transport by padding the trunk and branches gently with burlap and tying loose ends with soft rope or twine.

Plant as soon as possible after delivery. If planting is not possible right away, store the tree in a cool, shaded area and water as needed to keep the roots and soil moist.



PREPARE THE PLANTING SPOT

Dig a hole two to three times wider than the container or root ball. The hole should only be as deep as the root ball. When placed in the hole, the root collar (i.e. where the roots join the main stem or trunk) should be equal to or slightly above the depth of the hole.

Roughen the sides and bottom of the hole to allow root penetration.



PLANT YOUR TREE WITH CARE

For trees in containers, gently slide the root ball out of the pot and into the hole. For burlapped trees, place the root ball in the hole and gently cut away the wire basket and burlap.

Plant the tree so that the top of the root ball is flush with the top of the hole and the tree is vertical. Fill the hole in and around the root ball with the soil removed from the hole or good quality soil. Do not return any grass or sod to the hole.

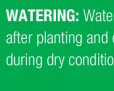


Gently pack the soil around the root ball until the hole is two-thirds full to remove air pockets. Fill the remaining space with water to settle the soil and allow the hole to drain. Finish filling the hole with soil and make a ridge of soil around the root ball to direct water towards the roots.

TAKING CARE OF YOUR TREE



MULCH: Apply two to four inches of mulch around the tree over the area of the root ball to reduce the growth of weeds and retain water in the soil. Be sure to keep mulch two to three inches away from the trunk of the tree.



WATERING: Water slowly and deeply immediately after planting and once a week or more as needed during dry conditions to keep the soil moist.



FERTILIZING: Avoid applying fertilizer, except for bone meal or high phosphorus fertilizer, in the first year after planting. A higher nitrogen fertilizer can be applied later on for greening and top growth.



STAKING: Staking trees is not necessary unless they are exposed to high winds or if the soil is shallow. Remove stakes after one year.



PRUNING: Prune at planting to improve branch spacing and promote a strong structure by removing dead, damaged, or rubbing branches. Trees should be pruned while dormant in late fall or early spring.
