

Winter Parking Regulations

Under the authority of Section 202 of Chapter 293 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the Motor Vehicle Act:

- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street between the hours of 1am and 7am of the same day.
- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street that will hinder, inconvenience or prevent removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.
- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street during the period from one hour after any snowstorm has commenced to two hours after such snowstorm has

These regulations will be in full force and effective annually from December 1 to March 31 inclusive.

Home & Business

Recently we have been made aware of several suspicious activities in and around businesses in town. This is not to make people worry, but more to bring awareness to the community.

We are encouraging all business owners and residents to stay vigilant and report any suspicious activity to the police. We also ask you to ensure all doors and windows are secure and locked when leaving your home or business. Working together we can keep our community safe.

Locks

Securing all doors is the first logical step in protecting your home and/or business against burglary. Therefore, the installation of auxiliary locks is a necessary requirement. It must be understood that no lock, no matter how good, can make a house, store or office burglar-proof. Good locks, however, can be an effective deterrent against break-ins. The more difficult the lock, the less likely a culprit is to attempt or to succeed in breaking into a premises.

Deadbolts:

Deadbolt locks gets their name from the fact that they only move with a key or thumb turn. They cannot be slipped with a card or shim tool because no springs are attached. You must use a key to lock deadbolts from the outside. The following points should be considered when selecting a deadbolt:

- The bolt should be no less than one (1) inch long when fully extended, and should retain part of the bolt within the mechanism itself. This ensures some degree of strength where the bolt and mechanism meet.
- The outside collar surrounding the cylinder should be of substantial construction not a thin metal that can be easily crushed or ripped open. A slip ring is a feature of some deadbolts that allows the collar to rotate freely and prevents the cylinder from being twisted off with the force of vice grips or a pipe wrench.
- It is important that a suitable strike plate be attached to the frame to ensure a strong anchor point for the bolt.
- A deadbolt lock is available with a double cylinder and requires a key to lock it from both the inside and outside. This is a useful feature where the inside thumb turn can be reached from a broken or forced window near the lock. A wraparound door guard is a feature that protects the lock and reinforces the door around the lock. It is available from any locksmith.

Interlocking Bolt Rim Locks:

Auxiliary locks, such as interlocking bolt rim locks, are commonly referred to as "jimmy-proof" locks. Instead of the normal horizontal bolt, there are two vertically moving deadbolts that lock into a frame-mounted striker so that the lock and striker are firmly interlocked. If it is not necessary to unlock the door from the outside (i.e. the back door of a retail outlet), then the lock can be installed with an inside cylinder only. Because the striker is mounted on a minimum amount of wood, these locks are ideally suited to wooden frames or in places where there are side lights.

Exposed Hinges:

If your door opens outward, you must ensure that your exposed hinges are secured. If exposed hinge pins can be removed, then an intruder can gain entry by swinging the door on the lock after prying open the single hinge.

Ensure that your door is equipped with non-removable hinge pins.

Drill a matching hole in each hinge leaf or remove a matching screw from each. In one hole, insert a screw that is 1/2" longer than the hole is deep. Cut off the screwhead with a hacksaw so that the headless screws will fit into the hole on the opposite leaf when the door closes and will hold the door to the frame even with the hinge pins removed.

Prevent the removal of the hinge pins by drilling a small hole into the hinge and inserting a small steel pin or screw to hold the pin in place.

Fire Emergency Warning:

It is important to consider the safety of all occupants of your home and/or business when installing any double cylinder door lock. Always ensure that an exit is available by leaving the key in the lock when the home or business is occupied.







Notes, Notices and Updates from Town Hall



- → Councillor Pat Power was reappointed as Deputy Mayor for the two-year term ending Dec 2024
- → Council approved four heritage requests for building alterations, renovations, and/or signage installation and one request for rezoning from single residence to double residence.
- → Council approved a \$250 donation to the Red Cross Hurricane Fiona relief from the Councillors expense fund
- → Repairs to the ladder rungs on the wharf were approved and the investigation into future needs of the wharf is ongoing
- → Special thanks to all the folks that helped to organize this year's Parade of Lights and the One and Only Fall Music Fest
- → Beginning Jan 1, 2023 a new Water Service Contract will be implemented, ensuring that Town Hall will have the correct billing information for tenants and property owners watch for it in your next water bill!
- → Over 500 surveys were completed for the proposed Parking Permit Pilot Project with over half indicating they lived or worked in Town. Due to the responses the project will be tabled.
- → Water saddles were replaced along upper St. George St.
- → Council approved designating the Community Hub Gym a Comfort Centre
- → After receiving confirmation that the Town can install a crosswalk on Prince albert Rd. (Hwy 1), Council approved bringing the cost of a lighted and audible crosswalk on between the French Basin Trail and the railbed trail into Town to next year's budget development.
- → Daniel Wade joined the Town of Annapolis Royal and Town of Middleton as the Regional Director of Public Works. Daniel will alternate days between the communities.
- → Council and Staff are reviewing and updating the Town's strategic plan
- → Town staff have been fervently writing grant proposals for accessibility projects, a comfort centre generator, playground consultations and hurricane related trail repairs.

Did you know...

Dec 6, 1917 - Halifax Explosion French munitions ship Mont Blanc collided with the Belgian relief ship Imo. The resulting explosion, the largest before the advent of the atomic bomb, killed more than 1,600 people and injured 9,000

Dec 11, 1931 - Statute of Westminster passed establishing complete legislative equality between the parliaments of Britain and Canada, the closest Canada has come to a declaration of independence

Dec 12, 1938 - First mosque opens in Edmonton Alberta, the Al Rashid Mosque. In 1982 a new, larger Al Rashid Mosque opened and in 1992 the former mosque was preserved as an historical building and moved to Fort Edmonton Park

What's all the fuss about dirt?

Soil, also known as dirt, is a critical life support system for everything on earth. A mixture of minerals, living organisms such as worms, organic matter such as leaves, and water create the brown world beneath. Without soil providing the primary ingredient for life, plants, food production, microorganism colonies, and even artificial infrastructures such as highways and buildings would not be viable, and the planet would no longer be stable.


Productive and healthy soils are essential for healthy plant growth, nutrition, water filtration, combating climate change, etc. The ground is the anchor for plant roots and holds the necessary nutrients for plants to thrive, including plants grown in crops or plantations for human and animal consumption and acts as a filtration device to buffer against pollutants, protecting

store large amounts of organic carbon, healthy soil creates a highly efficient carbon sink and stores roughly 15 gigatons of carbon,

groundwater quality. Healthy soil regulates the discharge of excess rainwater that can cause flooding and supports resilient landscapes from human degradation and natural disasters such as forest fires. To three times more carbon storage than all terrestrial plants on earth combined. Soil is considered a natural resource that can appear endless in

supply. However, the soil is a fragile product produced from thousands of years of decomposition of organic matter on earth. Due to climate change and other factors such as human development, the soil is eroding quicker than it is being formed, sparking the discussion on whether soil is a renewable resource. Below a layer of organic matter that will eventually break down into topsoil, topsoil is the second closest layer to the land's surface and contains much of the nutrients required for healthy growth in plants. This level is subjected to erosion from wind and water, decreasing soil fertility and stunting crops and plant growth. The pressures of population growth, food insecurity and agricultural intensification will further widespread degradation, and these challenges will only intensify. Productive, healthy soil is key to environmental sustainability and combating

climate change. However, the planet's soil is rapidly deteriorating around the globe, and rebuilding degraded soils is crucial in maintaining world and human health.


