News and Updates

A warm thank you!

Grant news

On March 31, 2023, the Town received notice of a grant of \$249,254 from the Province of Nova Scotia's Sustainability Services Growth Fund. The money will be used to install solar panels and a generator for the Town of Annapolis sewage lagoon which requires a continuous energy source to provide the Town with dependable water filtration. Annapolis Royal currently relies on Nova Scotia Power to provide all energy needs to the lagoon. This dependency results in high utility bills, increasing energy costs annually, supporting a carbon-heavy grid, and spending more when the system does not require the minimum energy rate. Annapolis Royal's goal is to transition off sole dependency on N.S Power and the solar photovoltaic (or PV) system installation project for Annapolis Royal is another step towards conversion to renewable energy to support the Town's energy needs. In 2019, CARP successfully applied for the Low Carbon Communities (LCC) fund to support the installation of a 10 KW public solar energy demonstration system on the roof of the Community Hub building. Solar panels and a generator will be installed near the facilities to offload the high amount of energy needed to run the sewage treatment plant.

Thanks to the combined efforts of the ABoT, AIRO, the Farmers' and Traders' Market Association and Town staff, Develop Nova Scotia has awarded the group \$60,000 from its Community-led Placemaking Program. The project will support a number of facilities improvements and new activities at the Farmers' Market and the wharf, as well as improvements in wayfinding signage.

And contributions from the public are starting to come in to support plans for a much-needed upgrade to the Town playground facilities. There is a button the Town website for CanadaHelps which provides tax receipts for contributions.

By-election coming up

Nomination Day for a new Councillor to fill the vacancy on Town Council has been set for May 16, 2023. The filling of this vacancy is of great importance to the Town since a recent Boundary Review completed by the Nova Scotia Utility and Review Board confirmed that the Town would be best governed by a Council of at least 5 members. Given that the next general municipal elections will be held in November of 2024, this is a good opportunity for community-minded individuals to consider serving for a period of just over a year. If you are interested in finding more about what is involved, Town staff can direct you to the applicable sections of the Nova Scotia Elections Act. The Code of Conduct for Elected Officials may be found on the Town website.





Earth Worm Fundraiser!

Remember the CBC's Friendly Giant? The "giant" opened the TV show by inviting everyone to look up, look way up. If you are concerned about climate change and wish there was something you could do to help save the earth, the congregation of St. George and St. Andrew United Church is giving you a reason to look way up to see how you can help make the air in our little town a little cleaner and help save the earth - and it will only cost you \$1.00!

We are installing forty four solar panels on the roof of our church, at a cost of \$480 per panel. We are inviting you to join us in a project to sell 480 crocheted Earth Worms, at a cost of \$1 each, to cover the cost of one of the panels which will be designated as our Earth Worm panel. Everyone from the very young to the very old will be able to contribute and join with others in the community to make this project a success.



Buy one for yourself or to share with a special friend or family member. Or you could carry one in your pocket to give to someone you want to thank for being kind to you. Each Earth Worm will be packed in it's own little paper bag, hand made from old seed catalogues and magazines. We have a "worry worm" version which is meant to be a comfort object similar to a "worry stone" but more colourful and cuddly, a bookmark version, and a limited number of cat toys containing local home-grown catnip which will be sold for \$2 each. A selection of these items will be available at the Mad Hatter Books in Annapolis Royal and from members of the congregation. CHIEFS CORNER

Alarm Systems

An alarm system can be a positive addition to the security arsenal of any home. The lifestyles of some families make the installation of some kind of alarm necessary. If, for instance, a home is vacant during the daytime or on weekends, or the home is situated in an isolated location, it could be considered more vulnerable to a break-in than other homes.

The addition of an alarm system is an effective way to augment other physical security mechanisms such as auxiliary locks and window security. Alarm systems can also help ensure greater peace of mind for those who must leave their homes unattended for extensive periods of time.

Alarm systems are available in a variety of forms, ranging from basic self-contained units suitable for a simple door or window to more elaborate systems that can be wired to sound a bell


or horn at the residence or at a central monitoring location.

The decision to install any alarm system should be made after careful consideration of the lifestyle of the residents using the system. If, for example, there are several family members coming and going from a residence throughout the day, then a coded alarm system may be preferable to a keyed system.

If there are animals in the residence, for instance, a motion detector may not be advisable because it could be accidentally triggered by pets roaming about the house.

Make inquiries with several reputable alarm companies before deciding which type to purchase.

Please note that if have or are installing an alarm system it is the owner's responsibility to ensure it is in good working order. If an alarm that is not maintained properly gives cause for the police to attend on more than one occasion for a false alarm, the owner could be billed going forward for any further false activations that police are requested to attend.



Grant Potter Memorial Playground Revitalization Project

The Grant Potter Memorial Park & Playground is now open for the 2023 season and has been prepared for an upgrade and revitalization project. The ongoing revitalization project plan is divided into two parts; addressing drainage to ensure accessible walkways, installing new inclusive swings, slides, climbing and balance features, and a gazebo/shaded seating area will be "Phase I". Upon completion of this work, the boat is to be replaced with an equally exciting but more accessible and inclusive new boat in Phase II.

The estimated cost for Phase I is \$142,000. The Town of Annapolis Royal has applied for both Federal and Provincial accessibility and facility funding to support this, but as part of the Town's contribution we still need your help! As part of the budgeting and grant application process we have set a local fundraising contribution goal of \$10,000. These cash donations will be directly applied to the purchase of new features such as a double slide, swing set, and shaded seating area, which will be purchased and installed as soon as these fundraising goals are reached. New Legislation to Help Fix Healthcare

Nova Scotians want and deserve to get the care they need, faster. We need to use every tool at our disposal to create solutions to make that happen.

That's why we were pleased to recently pass the Patient Access to Care Act, a significant law that will improve access to healthcare in our province.

We know we need to recruit doctors, nurses, and other healthcare providers. Nova Scotia is the best place in the world to live, but there is a national shortage and we're competing with other provinces and beyond.

This law makes it quicker and easier for healthcare providers to come here from other parts of Can-

ada. It requires their applications be processed within five business days and removes application fees. It also makes it easier for healthcare professionals licensed outside of Canada to come here.

We also need our healthcare professionals working to their full scope of practice. This law will allow them to use all of their skills to benefit their patients. For example, we've had great success working with pharmacists to expand their scope. They can now assess and prescribe for some illnesses, like strep throat.

We all want healthcare providers to spend their time caring for Nova Scotians, not filling out unnecessary paperwork.

With the new Act, employers can no longer ask for doctor's notes, except in specific situations. This has been a waste of valuable time for our doctors, time they can't afford to waste. This one change could free up to 50,000 hours of physician time. That's like getting another 25 doctors for Nova Scotians!

The Patient Access to Care Act means more healthcare providers coming to Nova Scotia, working to their full scope and spending more time with patients. It allows us to quickly adapt to changing needs of Nova Scotians.

Safety is our priority in any changes we make. We will ensure the act protects Nova Scotians while moving the system forward, faster. We would never lower the high standard of care in this province.

But we cannot continue to do things the way we used to and expect different results. This law makes changes that should have happened a long time ago.




