Along with the Natal Days Weekend festivities from August 4-7, there's a ton to see and do including the AR5K Road race on August 20, the Wednesday and Saturday Markets, special events at the Library, Kings' Theatre, and Historic Gardens, and much more...

A special series of free summer concerts also take place on Fridays from 6-8 PM (and on Saturday, Aug. 5 during the Natal Days Weekend) at the Oqwa'titek Amphitheatre. 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MAYOR'S MESSAGE



News and Updates

The life of a town is marked by so many large and small events and things that shape it over time. Some are happy, some are funny, and some are sad. This week we said goodbye to Monica Mills, Accounting and OHS Administrator, one of the faces of the Town for almost thirteen years. We wish her every success as she goes on to a new position with the Department of Natural Resources. And this week, Executive Assistant Krista Grear, also producer of the Town Crier Newsletter, will be leaving us to assume the position of Executive Assistant with the Town of Middleton. Given our close relationship with Middleton, we will be able to continue working with her across the region.

On Sunday, July 23, Port Royal Legion Branch #21 announced that President Bradley Bent had passed away suddenly over the weekend. Brad served the Legion as President from 2000 -2002, then 2008-2009 and finally 2013-2023. A celebration of his life was held at the Legion on July 24 and was attended by about 300 people. A friend and mentor to so many, he will be sorely missed by Legion members and the community as a whole.

On Friday, July 28, there will be a ceremony to mark the second largest Acadian deportation in Nova Scotia. The Acadian flag will be raised and the Acadian national anthem will be sung at Town Hall at 5:30 pm and a delegation of Acadian descendants will make its way down to Queen's Wharf at Fort Anne for a ceremony that will include a proclamation by the Town Crier on the Great Upheaval and the 1,664 Acadians deported from that wharf on December 8, 1755. A representative of the Association of Acadian Families of Port-Royal 1632-1755 will then say a few words. Seven roses will be laid on the rocks of the wharf to commemorate the deported Acadians who left on seven English boats. The end of the event will coincide with the beginning of Music at the O' this Friday so if you get to the amphitheatre earlier, you can take in both events from there.

Representatives of the Association francophone de la Vallée came to Fort Anne on July 24 to discuss plans for the celebration of National Acadian Day on August 15. There is an opportunity to raise awareness of Acadian history in this area by promoting it well beyond our borders.

Finally, the Federation of Nova Scotia Municipalities is hosting a meeting with the Nova Scotia Department of Municipal Affairs and Housing and the Service Exchange and Municipal Government Act Review Committee regarding Service Exchange. between the Province and municipal units this week. This is a hot topic for all municipal units in Nova Scotia and will be the subject of a future report here.

There are a great many events planned for the rest of the summer and into the fall, too many to list here, but you will find the information in the usual places, including this Newsletter.



Downtown Parking

A subject on every Traffic Flow Advisory Committee agenda, and likely all our minds, is parking downtown. With increased traffic, tourists and visitors it can be a challenge to find a spot. With more and more electric vehicles, the two charging station spots are at a premium.

Remember to use parking etiquette. Respect the 4-hour limit on St. George Street, and elsewhere. Respect the 2-hour limit by the church on Victoria Street. Only park in the indicated spots on the wharf and do not park in front of the boat haul-up.

There are a number of parking options available. Use parking lots rather than on-street parking. The designated parking lots for unlimited day parking are as follows:

Town Hall, 285 St. George Street, Sinclair Inn Museum, 230 St. George Street, The Farmers' Market, 194 St. George Street, Port Royal Legion, 66 Victoria Street, and French Basin Trail, 112 Prince Albert Road.

Whenever possible walk, bike or car pool. There are plenty of lovely trails that can take you where you need to go too! These are great options for your physical and mental wellbeing as well as the well-being of the planet!



I thought it would be great to share over the next two Chiefs corner segments the process in a criminal case. The information was obtained straight from the Public Prosecution Service in Nova Scotia.

The Criminal Case Explained Part 1

A criminal prosecution can be long and complicated; not easily understood by those with little or no familiarity with the Canadian criminal justice system. Often, Canadians' ideas of how criminal cases are conducted come from what they've seen on American television. This gives way to false impressions and inaccuracies about criminal prosecutions in Canada. This page takes you—step—by-step—through a Canadian criminal case. It explains the process clearly and simply and will help you to understand how a Canadian criminal prosecution works.

Deciding whether to prosecute

The Crown Attorney is responsible for deciding whether to go ahead with a prosecution. Sound knowledge of the law, experience and judgment helps the Crown Attorney to answer two very important questions:

- Is there a realistic prospect of conviction?
- Is it in the public interest to proceed?

If the answer to both of these questions is yes, the Crown Attorney will prosecute. If the answer to either or both of these questions is no, the Crown Attorney will not prosecute. In this way, the Crown Attorney uses what is called prosecutorial discretion.

A realistic prospect of conviction is based on the strength of the evidence. Whether a prosecution is in the public interest is based on a number of factors. For example, the crime may be a minor one, or the accused may be in poor health, or the accused may be very old, or the victim may not wish to go ahead, or the crime may have been committed a long time ago. In such a case, the Crown Attorney may decide it is not in the public interest to prosecute.

Investigation

Criminal investigations are conducted by the police. Investigations are started when police see behaviour or receive information about behaviour which may be a crime. Some criminal investigations are completed quickly. Other investigations take weeks, months, or, in complex matters, years to complete.

Laying a charge

The decision to lay a charge is the responsibility of the police. The police may lay a charge if, based on reasonable grounds, they believe a person has committed a crime. To help them make this decision, the police sometimes ask a Crown Attorney for advice. But the decision to lay a charge is the responsibility of the police.

When the police lay a charge, they complete an information package describing all of the evidence and deliver the information to the Crown Attorney. This information package is also given to the accused person. The police deliver to the court a list of charges against the accused person.

In Canada, less serious charges are referred to as summary offences, while more serious offences are referred to as indictable offences. In the United States, less serious offences are called misdemeanors and serious offences are called felonies.



There are conditions, but it is worth finding out more. The costs are a reasonable \$25 for 1 year or \$50 for 3 years (that's 1 free year!) for businesses. For nonprofit organizations, placement is free, but you must submit an application

When placed in the middle of the sidewalk they become a hazard for pedestrians and create difficulties for individuals with mobility differences. IN OTHER NEWS



Healthcare recruitment efforts paying off.

It's no secret we need more people working in healthcare. Recruitment and retention are the biggest challenges facing our system.

It impacts how quickly Nova Scotians get the care they need. And it affects the morale of hardworking medical professionals who are burning out and need support.

Here's the good news - every day more Nova Scotians are stepping up to help.

A record 233 resident doctors began training Premier Tim Houston in July. That includes 80 new family practice residents and many more training in specialty care.

What does this mean for you? More doctors.

Some will be taking over from retiring physicians. Others will open new practices. This is great news!

It's the largest medical residency training class in the province's history. That's because people want to come here and work here. They see positive changes happening and want to be a part of it (our scenery and seafood doesn't hurt though!).

One of the first things our government did was offer a job to every graduating nurse in this province. I met with nursing students and was surprised to find that even with over a thousand vacancies, nurses were struggling to get

Since we made this offer, more than 400 nursing graduates have joined the system.

Our government recently invested in a partnership with Cape Breton University, Acadia University and NSCC to create nearly 250 new nurse training opportunities. This is in addition to the 200 nursing seats we announced last year.

I also visited the new class of paramedics who started training in July. They're part of more than 80 new paramedics currently training in the prov-

We urgently need more paramedics. It's why we're providing an \$11,500 tuition rebate to paramedics who work here for three years. We also hired nearly 140 operators to handle routine transfers so our paramedics can be where they're needed most - responding to emergencies.

In February, we celebrated the halfway point to our goal to train 2,000 continuing care assistants (CCAs). Training more CCAs ensures seniors have the dignity and care they deserve. It means supporting people in their communities and freeing up hospital beds.

To our graduates and those starting their training – from the bottom of my heart, THANK YOU. You are part of the solution, and we couldn't be prouder.

We'll continue to train more Nova Scotians and retain the incredible professionals we have. I wish it could happen overnight, but every day we're building a brighter future for healthcare.


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
