MAYOR'S MESSAGE



News and Updates

On behalf of Town Council and staff, I would like to express our thanks to the Natal Day team and its many partners for a truly wonderful Natal Day weekend. The feedback from people who attended the various events over the weekend was overwhelmingly positive.



And thank you to the Association des Familles de Port-Royal 1632-1755 (Acadian Families of Old Port-Royal 1632-1755), the Association francophone de la Vallée (Annapolis Valley Francophone Association), Parks Canada, and the many others who assisted with two Acadian events this year, the commemoration of the second largest expulsion of Acadians in Nova Scotia from Annapolis Royal, and the celebration of Acadian Day on August 15. Thanks to the work of the Annapolis Heritage Society and support from the provincial Bureau of Acadian Affairs and others, there is now an Acadian room at the O'Dell House Museum. All of this paves the way for the Congrès Mondial acadien (Acadian World Congress) when visitors will pass through our area next year on their way to celebrations in Clare and Argyle.

Congratulations are also in order for ARCAC's successful Paint the Town weekend with 80 artists registering for the event.

Thank you to all who planned and carried out successful events in August!

Municipal Cooperation: The Town, the Municipality of the County of Annapolis, and the Town of Middleton have established a Working Group to look for ways to provide more effective and efficient collaboration including service delivery, infrastructure development and operations, marketing and promotion, communications, short and long-term planning, economic and community development advocacy with provincial and federal governments, taxation strategies, and financial stewardship. This is consistent with the Town's strategic plan which cites collaboration as a strategic objective for sustainability.

Service Exchange (who pay for what): The Province has been working with a committee of the Nova Scotia Federation of Municipalities on service exchange. The following summarizes a recent offer made to Nova Scotia towns and counties: The **Municipal Financial Capacity Grant (MFCG)** would be unfrozen with elements of the formula modernized. Those municipalities which would see a decrease in their MFCG funding under the new formula would receive non-renewable top-up funding for 5 years. The Town's amount under the new formula would decrease from \$41,956 to \$32,211. The Town would therefore be eligible for a top-up of \$9,745 for five years.

The Province would absorb the costs associated with the mandatory contributions to **Corrections**. This would save the Town approximately \$11,260 annually.

The Province would absorb the annual costs associated with **public housing losses**. This would save the Town approximately \$67,295 annually.

The Province would create an application based funding program for **roads** for towns. \$6M would be available for 50-50 cost sharing for repaving trunks and routes which are municipally owned.

Welcome to new staff: Kim Dunning joins us on Monday August 28th as the new Executive Assistant. Kim is highly experienced in government office administration with her most recent experience with the BC provincial government. Melanie Stubbs joins us on September 5 as the Accounting Assistant. She comes to us from the Pines where she worked as the Director of Finance for the past year. Melanie also has extensive municipal experience from her years in Ontario.

Our Project team, made up of representatives from the Annapolis Board of Trade, AIRO (Annapolis Investments in Rural Opportunity), Annapolis Farmers & Traders Market, and the Town of Annapolis Royal, have been working diligently to get as many of the elements of our Build Nova Scotia supported projects completed.

One of the most highly anticipated elements just wrapped up...the incredible mural installed by artist Lorne Julien at the end of the Annapolis Royal Wharf. The whole team is delighted with his work and the feedback from the community has been wonderful.

The new locally designed benches are truly making this a destination spot in the town. There are a few more things coming to the wharf before that project will be fully completed.

The work at Market Square continues but again, the elements already added there (new stage and seating) have been welcomed with open arms. It's certainly making that space come to life and inviting people to use the Square in more ways...even if it's just to sit and enjoy your lunch or have a visit with friends and neighbours.

Stay tuned for future updates as more elements of our projects are installed!

I thought it would be great to share over the next two Chiefs corner segments the process in a criminal case. The information was obtained straight from the Public Prosecution Service in Nova Scotia.

The Criminal Case Explained Part 2

Arraignment of the accused and bail

Most persons who are charged with a crime are given a written description of the charge by the police. This document also names a date and court for them to appear to answer to the charge.

Sometimes the crime is very serious or the accused person has a criminal record. In these cases, the accused person may be held in jail until his or her first court appearance. At the first court appearance, the charge is read to the accused by the judge. This act of reading the charge to the accused is the arraignment.

If the accused has been held in jail, the judge will usually hold a bail hearing to determine whether the accused should be released or held until trial. If released, the accused may be ordered to obey certain conditions. Such conditions may be a curfew or not having any contact with the victim or witnesses. The accused person could be charged with a further offence if he or she fails to obey these conditions.

Choice of trial court by the accused

If the accused is charged with a summary offence, his or her trial will be in the provincial court before a judge. This is the same court in which the accused appeared for arraignment.

If the accused is charged with an indictable offence, he or she will usually have the choice of a trial in Provincial Court or in Supreme Court. If the accused chooses a Supreme Court trial, he or she may ask the Provincial Court to hold a preliminary inquiry to decide whether there is enough evidence to have the case go to trial. When the accused chooses to have the trial in Supreme Court, he or she may have the trial with or without a jury.

Preliminary inquiry

When a person charged with an indictable offence chooses to have a Supreme Court trial, a preliminary inquiry is usually first held in the Provincial Court. Sometimes, an accused person will give up the right to a preliminary inquiry and go directly to trial.

The preliminary inquiry is held to determine whether the Crown has enough evidence to go to trial. The preliminary inquiry also gives the accused a chance to see and hear the Crown's evidence. In Canada, the Crown does not get the same chance to see and hear the defense's evidence before trial. At the end of the preliminary inquiry, the judge will decide whether the case will go to trial or end at that point.

Entering a plea

On a summary offence, after the accused is arraigned he or she will be asked to plead. In Canada, an accused may plead guilty or not guilty. When the accused is charged with an indictable offence, he or she will make a plea in Provincial Court or Supreme Court - whatever court has been chosen for trial.

Judge or jury?

In Provincial Court, all trials are heard by judge alone, with no jury. In Supreme Court, the accused person has the right to choose a trial before either a judge alone or a judge and jury.

If the accused person chooses judge and jury, a jury of 12 Nova Scotians will be selected from a larger number of people, known as a jury panel. Individuals who are Canadian citizens and are 18 years of age or older may be chosen for jury panels from the current listing of those holding Nova Scotia Health Cards. The jury itself is selected from the panel through a process in which both the defense and Crown Attorney participate.

Our next segment will conclude this process.

Seniors Care Grant

Starting Friday, September 1, seniors can apply to the annual Seniors Care Grant program, which helps with expenses that allow them to stay in their homes longer and improve their quality of life.

The grant has been increased to \$750 and now includes home heating as an eligible service. To qualify, Nova Scotians must be 65 years or older by March 31, 2024, live in a home they own or rent, and have an annual household income of \$37,500 or less.

The grant helps seniors cover the costs of a range of healthcare and household services, including physiotherapy, medication and grocery delivery, phone services and home repairs. The grant may also be used for home heating costs, such as furnace oil, natural gas and electricity. 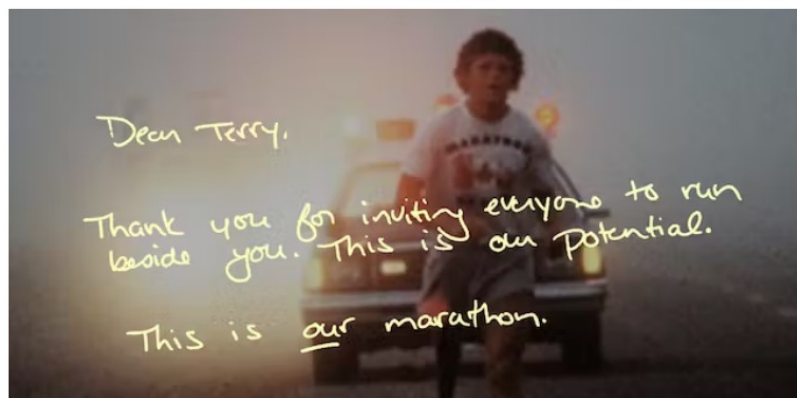

It's That Time of Year - Back to School!

Many kids and parents are excited. Parents may get a little time to themselves and kids get to catch up with old friends and make new ones.

It a time for parents and guardians to review school bus safety with their children. How to cross the street safely, remaining seated while the bus is moving, not to distract the driver, keep all your limbs inside the bus, do not block the aisle and always listen to the bus driver.

Its also a time for motorists to reacquaint themselves with the rules of the road and school bus safety. For the safety of the children, DO NOT pass a school bus when it is stopped with its lights flashing and stop sign open. A first offence under the Motor Vehicle Act for passing a stopped school bus carries a \$410 fine and six demerit points on your driver's license. For subsequent offences, the fine increases to \$1272.50.

News release: Home-Sharing Program Expands Municipal Affairs and Housing



Nova Scotians in search of an affordable space to rent now have more options and support.

The Province's partnership with online home-sharing platform Happipad – launched in the spring to help people displaced by wildfires – is now available to people across the province. The government is investing \$1.3 million over two years in the expansion.

"We all have a role to play as we work together to overcome this housing crisis, and today's announcement is a call to action to all Nova Scotians who may have extra space in their homes to consider hosting a person or family in their home," said Municipal Affairs and Housing Minister John Lohr. "We know we have 130,000 vacant bedrooms in Nova Scotia, and through this expanded program, more people like students, healthcare workers, tradespersons and any others who may need a safe, affordable and comfortable short-term accommodation could be matched with a room. This partnership truly encompasses the hospitable nature of all Nova Scotians."

Happipad does thorough background checks, matches renters with hosts, collects and distributes the rent, and provides dispute resolution support in case of host or renter concerns. Staff in Nova Scotia will provide user support.

Rents through Happipad are typically at rates below those of other rentals. Happipad users also report meaningful social connections, with options to share meals and other household activities.

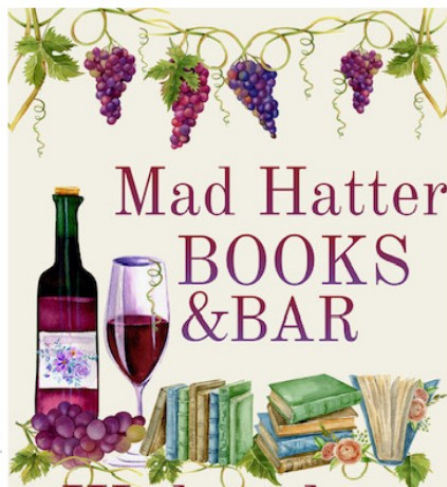
