

Town Hall will be closed for Monday, November 11, 2024 for Remembrance Day As we approach this last meeting of your 2020-2024 Town Council, it is a good time to reflect on what has happened over our four -year term.

COVID restrictions were still in effect when Council was sworn in in November 2020. On June 29, 2021, we confronted our first real emergency with the failure of the water supply tank in Lequille. Thanks to the Annapolis Royal and Bear River Fire Departments, water was trucked in for more than a week so that the Town was not without water.

2021 saw the development of a climate change plan for the Town, regular meetings with other municipal units in Kings and Annapolis Counties, the "Beyond Oqwa'titek" celebrations in September, and the relinquishing of the role of Town Crier by Peter Davies after more than 20 years of service along with his wife and escort Val Davies. There was an NSURB hearing dealing with the future of the Annapolis Royal tidal power plant, and comprehensive accessibility audits of Town owned facilities were completed by the Accessibility Advisory Committee. A strategic plan was developed with public input and our Police Department identified and implemented revenue generation opportunities of its own.

In 2022, work began on a two-year pilot project to provide additional executive staff to oversee the operations of Valley Waste and Kings Transit under one Board of Directors comprised of the mayors and wardens of all seven participating municipal units. The Chair of the Town's Environment Committee, John Bottomley, completed a comprehensive Flood Risk Assessment report based on past climate change studies and reports conducted from 1998 to 2021 that was used to leverage money from other sources for needed engineering studies. Following competition, Town Crier Christine Igot was appointed on May 18, 2022. Natal Day weekend celebrations resumed that year, and former Superintendent of Public Works, Kevin McLean retired on December 30, 2022 after 33 years of service.

In 2023, thanks to the hard work of the Annapolis Royal Twinning Committee, the Lieutenant Governor and his wife as well as other dignitaries came to Town on February 22 to view the film on Pierre Dugua de Mons, the man who financed the establishment of Port Royal over 400 years ago. Deputy Mayor Pat Power welcomed Their Honours to this event on the Town's behalf. It was her last public event as representative of the Town before her family and we suffered her loss. After a by-election, Paul Wear was appointed as a Councillor to fill the vacant seat on Council.

In July, a twinning delegation from our sister city, Royan France which included Mayor Patrick Marengo and ten others will visited us and the Annapolis Royal Twinning Committee held a series of events for the lead-up to and the visit itself which included the first public celebration of Pierre Dugua Day and the first meeting between the Mi'kmaq and the French in 400 years at Bear River First Nation.

The Town, the Municipality of the County of Annapolis, and the Town of Middleton established a Working Group to look for ways to collaborate more effectively on service delivery, infrastructure, operations, marketing and promotion,

communications, short and long-term planning, economic and community development, advocacy with provincial and federal governments, taxation strategies, and financial stewardship.

A public meeting on Town infrastructure was held on May 13, 2024 with two representatives from the Atlantic Management Network (AIMN). Their report projected annual costs for maintaining all of the infrastructure we now have including roads, sidewalks, water and wastewater systems, Town-owned buildings and facilities, etc.; like other municipal units, the Town is facing significant infrastructure deficits that will need to be addressed in future years. Their report included the following estimates:

- estimates of costs for demolition (\$1M), rehabilitation, (\$2.7M), and reconstruction of the Town wharf (\$5M+)
- estimate of cost for a seawall to protect the downtown from flooding (\$4.6M) Complete reports and summaries appear on the Town's Engage page on the website.

It will be up to a future Council to consider next steps for public consultation and to decide how best to respond to the challenges ahead.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank members of Council and staff for all of their efforts over the last four years. Although we did not always agree, we all came together to make decisions that we believed to be in the best interest of the Town as a whole. It has been a pleasure serving the people of this Town.

Tips For Parents:

- Children's Halloween costumes should be bright and made of non-flammable material
- Attach reflective tape or other material to costumes to make trick-or-treaters more visible
- Costumes should be short enough in length to prevent tripping
- For added safety, have children carry flashlights
- Facial make-up is the recommended means of disguise
- If masks are worn, eye holes should be large enough so as not to restrict vision
- Young children should be accompanied by adults or travel together in groups while trick-or-treating
- Ensure children trick-or-treat on one side of the street and avoid zigzagging across the road
- Cross only at corners
- Children should also be advised to walk on the sidewalks and stay off roads and lawns

Tips For Children:

- Trick-or-treating should occur in the early evening hours
- Always let your parents know where you will be going
- Never travel in areas that are dark and vacant
- Never talk to strangers
- Never go with anyone if your parent(s) or caregiver has not given you permission
- Never enter a home without your parent(s)' or caregiver's permission. Always stand at the door. Stay away from homes that are in total darkness.
- Never go anywhere with strangers or someone you don't know very well. Always check with your parents first.
- Never enter a home of a stranger. Always stand at the door. Stay away from homes that are in total darkness.
- Take Halloween treats home for inspection by your parents before eating them

Winter Parking Regulations

Under the authority of Section 202 of Chapter 293 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1989, the Motor Vehicle Act:

- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street between the hours of 1 am and 7 am of the same day.
- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street that will hinder, inconvenience, or prevent removal of snow or ice from such highway or street.
- No parking or standing of any vehicle upon any street during the period from one hour after any snowstorm has commenced to two hours after such snowstorm has stopped.



These regulations will be in full force and effective annually from December 1 to March 31 inclusive

SERVICE NOVA SCOTIA--Heating Assistance Rebate Program Opens October 1

Eligible Nova Scotians can receive a \$600 rebate on their home heating bills by applying to the Heating Assistance Rebate Program (HARP), opening October 1 for the 2024-25 season.

"The colder season can be an especially tough time of year for Nova Scotians who are struggling to cover their bills, and we know this year will be no different," said Colton LeBlanc, Minister of Service Nova Scotia. "The Heating Assistance Rebate Program helps ease the costs of home heating for those who need it. It's one of many ways we'll be supporting Nova Scotians this season."

Nova Scotians applying for the HARP rebate may also be eligible for the Seniors Care Grant, the Property Tax Rebate for Seniors, the long-running Your Energy Rebate Program, and the Home Energy Assistance Top-up Fund administered by the Salvation Army.

Families earning a net, or after-tax, income of up to \$75,000 or single-person households earning a net income up to \$55,000 are eligible to apply for a HARP rebate, whether they rent or own.

As part of the program requirements, applicants may be asked to provide a heating bill. Applicants can speed up the process by providing a heating bill when they apply.



Preserving and Promoting Our Heritage

Annapolis Royal has the highest proportion of its built environment of any municipality in Canada registered as heritage property. A Registered Heritage Properties map shows federal, provincial and municipally registered properties in Annapolis Royal as well as the Annapolis Royal National Historic District. A statement of Why We Have Heritage

Properties and descriptions of most of the Registered Heritage Properties will be found here.

Much, but by no means all, of the Town's efforts to preserve and promote our heritage rests with the Planning and Heritage Advisory Committee (PHAC). The Committee provides advice to council on the preparation of or amendment of the Municipal Planning Strategy, the Land Use By-Law and other related matters, including all matters concerning the preservation of built heritage within the Town of Annapolis Royal and heritage issues in general

There are numerous Acts, By-Laws, and Policies that define the Committee's responsibility. They start with the Nova Scotia Heritage Property Act and include the Town's Heritage Property By-Law, the Planning and Heritage Committee By-Law, and the Building and Alteration Guidelines Policy.

A brief description of the responsibilities of the Planning and Heritage Advisory Committee, with copies of previous meeting Minutes, will be found here.

Ever wonder what the Town Environment Advisory Committee is and what it does? We are a group of citizens of Annapolis Royal and surrounding area that have volunteered to provide advice to Council on "environmental issues related to sustainability, advocacy and stewardship within the Town of Annapolis Royal" (from our mandate letter).

So, who are we? Currently a Town Councillor and a member from Clean Annapolis River Project (CARP), The Town Chief Administrative Officer (CAO), and five members drawn from the Town and surrounding area sit on the committee. We also have a Climate Lead who has recently joined our group, generously funded by the Clean Foundation, a non-governmental organization dedicated to supporting green initiatives across in Nova Scotia and PEI.

Well, what do we do? We provide advice, as our mandate says, on a wide variety of environmental issues. For example, we have struck a "task team" to explore the changes announced to the Coastal Protection Act. This task team will examine how the new approach of the Provincial Government will affect the Town and what bylaws to consider to protect vulnerable shorelines.

We also organize community events drawing the public's collective eyes to environmental issues. An example of this is our street cleanup drive, which is tentatively scheduled for November 9 th. 10 am -12 pm a part of this effort will be a campaign to encourage smokers to utilize the outdoor butt disposal bins in areas around town. You will also start seeing reminders for dog folks to pick up any "remnants" of your walk and properly dispose of those bags.

We also provide input on grant applications for projects to enhance our local environment. One example of this is the current application by the Town for grants to restore the saltwater marsh (bits of which can be seen below the O) from the Town wharf to Fort Anne. The Town is applying for a series of grants that will provide funds to cover the complete project costs, in the area of \$1,000,000.

Our main focus currently is organizing a Climate Fair for November 2nd. This will involve a venue for local, provincial and national organizations to highlight their work. There will also be lectures/information sessions on topics of interest to the local community, such as the work to identify species at risk in forests scheduled for harvesting around Gold Lake. A group recently camped out there for over half a year doing intensive biological surveys to identify sites where vulnerable species are found. And, of course, this Climate Fair, like all the Environment Committee's events, are open to the public to attend.

One final word: volunteer! There are plenty of opportunities to help us keep this planet a habitable space. Come to the Climate Fair; where you can sign up and help us scour the streets on November 9th.







MARKETING AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE
